Hunting rules

Numbers of controlled Roosevelt elk tags for this year are reduced from 835 last year to 760 in 1984. Most are designed to control agricultural or tree damage. Dates varying according to individual hunts.

In eastern Oregon, a split general season for bull elk is again the case for most management units. The first runs from Oct. 31 through Nov. 4 and the second from Nov. 10 through 18. In most units bulls with visible antlers are legal game.

In the Chesnimnus unit a single season was set to run from Nov. 10 through 18 with 21,500 permits for spike bulls or better.

The Snake River 3-point rule will continue in effect this season with two hunts, 550 permits in each. The dates are the same as for the general bull season.

Controlled elk seasons are proposed in many eastern Oregon units. In some eastern Oregon units a controlled permit hunt for elk of either sex will again replace the second general bull season proposed in other units.

Bow hunters will have an early statewide deer and elk season similar to last year, running from Aug. 25 through Sept. 23.

In western Oregon the bag limit will be one deer and one spike elk through Sept. 7; after that the elk bag limit changes to "one elk" through the remainder of the season. (In Saddle Mountain and Tioga units, bowhunters will be allowed only cow elk or bulls with three points or larger and in the Rogue unit, deer with only forked horn or better.)

In eastern Oregon the bag limit is one buck deer with visible antlers and one elk. Exceptions are: (1) only bull elk may be taken in Sled Springs unit, (2) bull elk must have three points or better in Snake River unit, (3) Chesnimnus unit is closed to all bowhunting in 1984, (4) all units closed to rifle hunting for deer would also be closed to bowhunting for deer and, (5) deer taken on Steens Mountain must be 4-point or better.

A number of late season bowhunting opportunities are set for specific areas for deer and elk. All late season elk bowhunting opportunities are to be limited to 4,195 controlled hunt permits in five western Oregon areas. Muzzleloader hunts for 1984 are similar to last

year. Most are included in a "package" hunt in both western and eastern Oregon, with the Sixes unit as a new addition.

A separate Hart Mountain muzzleloader hunt was set for 200 permits for buck deer with not less than 3 antler points on one side. Hunters successful in drawing a permit for this hunt will have a two-year wait period.

Handgun hunting will again be allowed for deer, provided the hunter has his or her tag validated "handgun hunting only" prior to the season. By doing so, the hunter forfeits the privilege of hunting with other weapons during that season. Legal handguns are .25 caliber and larger.

Silver gray squirrel seasons are in a number of areas from Sept. 1 through Nov. 7, with a daily bag limit of five.

Tag sale deadlines are: Aug. 24 for deer and elk bowhunting tags; Sept. 28 for bear tags, rifle deer tags, and deer tag handgun validation; Oct. 30 for Rocky Mountain first period elk and Nov. 9 for second period tags; and Nov. 9 for first period Roosevelt elk tags, Nov. 16 for second period tags.

The deadline for applying for controlled and permit entry hunts is July 12 with the drawing on Aug. 14. Necessary forms and the regulations should be at license agencies about the third week in June.

Hawks set for regional meet

Nearly every one of the Oregon Cinder Hawks competing at the state Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships advanced to regional competition this weekend. Of the 39 members competing, 34 are eligible to advance to the competition at Mt. Hood Community College beginning June 30.

The regional meet will feature the best of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

In the state meet, also held at MHCC, the Hawks nailed down six first place medals and set four state Junior Olympic records.

Girl shot putters were foremost among the record setters, with Stephanie Miljus setting a meet record for 10-under girls on every throw. She ended with a put of 23-4. Wendy Coleman was also a record setter in the shot among 13-14 girls. Her throw was 37-6.

The Hawks 10-under boys mile relay team buried the old record by 13 seconds as Israel Matz, Andy Norman, Slade Watts and Nathan Furr easily outran Track City Track Club of Eugene to a 5:001 finish.

The fourth meet record came in the 15-16 3200m relay, where a good Hawks team of John Taylor, Sparky Pankey, Tom Bracco and David Burks ran uncontested.

A standout for the Hawks

in the meet was Gracie Pankey, running in the 10-under girls division. "She is what we strive for, a complete runner," said Coach Darold Beymer.

Pankey won the 100m dash, won the 800m, and was second in the 1500m.

Amy Rivers, running in the bottom of her age bracket, qualified for regionals with a well run fifth place in the 1500. In Bantam boys, Israel Matz qualified in the 1500m and 800m, while Andy Norman qualified in the 800. Nathan Furr advanced with a strong third in the 400m.

Qualifiers in the 11-12 800m were Mike Arrigotti and Darin Dunford. Arrigotti also qualified in the 1500m and Trent Waibel made it in the high jump.

The youth girls 1600m relay team of Ta Watts, Danielle Jordan, Karla Harrison and Kim

Yankauskas paved their way to regionals with second place. Jordan was also second in the javelin and Harrison added the 800m and long jump. Yankauskas will represent the Hawks in the 3,000m.

The boys 1600m relay team of Tom Romey, Tony Baracco, Richard Amburn and Tony Heffner took third in that event. Baracco also qualified in the 3000m and Heffner in the 800m.

Ronel Pankey moved into regionals with a 19-6 jump.

High school athletes

Sharon Jensen took first place in the long jump, breaking the Sandy High School record with a 17-6 1/2 leap. Lisa Lind was second in high jump at 5-2, while Chris Muff advanced in both shot and javelin. Denise Proctor will go to regionals in both shot and discus.

Joel Dose, Adam Ermatinger, Bob Collins and Brad Atkinson advanced in the 1600m relay with a fourth. Collins also qualified in both 110 and 400 intermediate hurdles.
