page for U.S. Representative Denny Smith last summer.

The Close-Up program operates on a \$13 million budget, 30 percent of which comes from corporate donations. It started in 1972 and now has participants from all 50 states. The teachers have a variety of experience. One had just spent a year in the U.S.S.R., and another had just passed the Massachusetts Bar exam.

As many as 1,500 students may be in Washington, D.C., at a time participating in the program.

The cost was \$825 for a week, which covered all expenses except souvenirs, and included a side trip to Williamsburg.

Donations from the Kiwanis, VFW, Optimists and Sandy High Boosters helped defray some of that expense.

He said the board of directors has been supportive of many of the things in which he has been involved. A captain in the Army Reserves, Key was recently selected to participate in an exercise in Japan that lasted 21 days. He is currently an intelligence of-

ficer with the Forest Grove Infantry Battalion, serving as fourth in command of the 1,000-man unit.

Key feels it is important for a social studies teacher to have a varied background, and he tries to let that experience spill over into the classroom.

For example, the trip to Washington included a visit to the Vietnam Memorial. Key served 26½ months as a "grunt" in the Marines. At the Memorial, he looked up the names of friends. All the dead are listed in chronological order.

Key, who came home from the war in 1968, has seen the issue from all angles.

"People are just now feeling good about this country again," he said. "Even though the country has done some things wrong, we do a lot that is right."

Key could serve in the Army full-time, but he would rather teach. As a result, some Sandy High students are learning about history and government firsthand.

About 20 local people have expressed interest in a Toastmasters club, he said. Members will meet weekly for a brown-bag lunch and "table topics" designed to help build speaking skills.

The Toastmasters' program also

includes a series of prepared talks that members will present to the group, Richards said. Speakers learn to develop voice modulation, correct grammar, eye contact, audience involvement and use of gestures.

"The idea is that if you're able to sell yourself, you will be better at selling your ideas," Richards said. "Every one of us is doing this to help better ourselves."

Dues will be \$12 for a six-month membership. Visitors are welcome at all meetings because a varied audience helps speakers improve their skills, Richards said.

Retired teacher Zimmermann dies

Funeral service for retired elementary teacher Edna Zimmermann will be held today, Dec. 13 at 1:30 p.m. in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Private burial will follow at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Gresham.

Mrs. Zimmermann died in Gresham on Dec. 9 at the age of 78.

She was born Edna Berthe Olson in Wisconsin on Nov. 25, 1906. While in her youth, her family moved to Butte, North Dakota, where she finished high school and continued her schooling, receiving a teaching certificate and beginning her career.

In 1933 she was married to Cornelius Rohde in North Dakota. They began their family there and in 1938 moved to Sandy. After living here for two years, they moved to Washington where she resumed teaching.

Returning to Sandy in 1948 to make their permanent home, she taught school at Boring and Pleasant Valley.

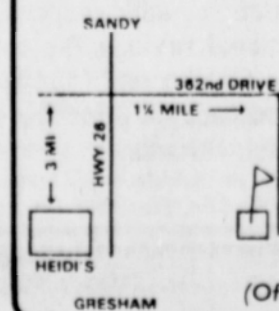
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
