Man pleads guilty in robbery

A Gresham man has admitted he is the burglar who was filmed taking video recorders from a southwest Portland store.

Ronald L. Beavers, 31, of Gresham, pleaded guilty in Washington County Circuit Court on Wednesday in connection with the Feb. 26 burglary at All-Star Video, 7170 SW Beaverton-Hillsdale Highway. He had earlier entered a plea of innocent.

Beavers' guilty plea was in exchange for dismissal of two other theft charges, said deputy district at-

torney Marianne O. Burris. However, Beavers accepted criminal liability for restitution purposes.

Burglars had hit the All-Star store twice in five days, prompting employees to set up three video cameras to film any subsequent break-ins. That night, cameras filmed three men prying open the front door and leaving with four video recorders.

The tape was broadcast on television news programs, which led to the charges against Beavers and James E. Phipps, 29, of Gresham. The third man hasn't been arrested.

House to censure Pat Gillis

It appears certain that state Representative-elect Pat Gillis will be censured by House members for his controversial campaign activities. The 24-year-old East County Republican could even be denied a seat.

The House will pick one of four options for Gillis when the Legislature opens its session Monday. But House Democrats apparently agreed at a caucus Saturday to not automatically seat Gillis.

"I don't know whether he'll be seated," said incoming state Rep. Rick Kotulski, D-Corbett, who attended the caucus at Silver Falls State Park. "But he will not be seated without at least a censure."

Gillis was on vacation in Mexico and unavailable for comment. Assistant House Minority Leader Randy Miller, R-Lake Oswego, said Gillis had planned to take a pre-session vacation before he knew about investigations into his campaign activities.

The latest probe involves the

Oregon Attorney General's office, which will investigate if Gillis knowingly violated state law when he claimed in the November Voters' Pamphlet that he earned a master's degree from Lewis and Clark College when he had not.

The attorney general's office could decide to file charges against Gillis in civil or criminal court, said Marla Rae, assistant to the attorney general. Rae didn't know when a decision would be reached.

The secretary of state's office forwarded its probe to the attorney general after it determined Gillis violated the corrupt practices law.

Gillis defeated Democratic incumbent Annette Farmer in the November House District 20 race. The district covers parts of East County and Gresham.

Incoming House Majority leader Shirley Gold, D-Portland, said it is difficult for the House to reach a conclusion on Gillis until it has more information on the allegations.

But Gold said House Democrats are united in their determination to discipline Gillis, and censure is the least of the punishments it could authorize.
