Unbelled black heifer leads to hunt

May 17, 1916: News from Kelso — Joel Jarl spent over a week hunting for a black heifer he forgot to bell. The heifer is still lost, and he quit his job.

Saturday was a fine day, and the track meet at Sandy was a success and enjoyed by a large crowd. Kelso won the championship with 201 points. The teachers, Mrs. Barnum and Miss Erickson, are to be congratulated for their long hours of training.

Cottrell did well too, both of their teachers, Mr. Roberts and Miss McMillan, are to be congratulated for their excellent work at the track meet. The Sandy band led the parade and made a fine showing.

It is much regretted that Will Bell, one of our promising young men, had to go through an operation for appendicitis in Portland. We all hope he recovers.

Several from Kelso attended the play given by the Sandy High School student body on Saturday night after the track meet. Their play was fine, but the trouble afterwards was a disgrace on all concerned. The pupils announced a dance at the close of the program. The high school teacher said there would be no dance and begged them all to leave. One high school director took sides with the youngsters, so they danced till 2 a.m. Sunday morning. The teacher then called a board meeting and expelled all the pupils who so willfully disobeyed. There are only seven left in the high school now. We are sorry to know that one of our Kelso high school girls stayed at that dance just to spite the teacher, and we know no good can come from that.

Limited prohibition went into effect in Oregon on Jan. 1, 1916. Tiplers can still purchase from out of state a maximum of 48 25-ounce bottles of beer and two quarts of hard liquor

each month.

Feb. 15, 1916 — W.A. Proctor of Sandy describes an experiment made by himself and another neighbor.

There is no use worrying over the legality of alcohol made from hard cider with the aid of a cream separator.

The Clackamas County farmer who asked District Attorney Hedges to pass upon the legality of alcohol made in this manner had better center his attention on his barn and crops and forget possible evasions of the prohibition laws, and District Attorney Hedges and his helper, Deputy District Attorney Burke, no longer need thumb through court decisions and statutes, according to W.A. Proctor, one of the most prominent residents of the eastern part of the county who is now attending a session of the grand jury in Oregon City.

Mr. Proctor said Tuesday night that a neighbor of his in the Sandy

district, a law abiding and Christian gentleman, Mr. Proctor explained, read in the newspapers that another farmer had sought advice from the district attorney on the process of alcohol making. He called Mr. Proctor, and the two conducted an experiment.

Hard cider was poured into the top end of the separator, and a liquid came from each one of the tubes. Both Mr. Proctor and neighbor tasted the liquid, with caution at first, and found that the stuff that came from the tubes was not a tasteless liquid, not alcohol as the inquiring farmer had said would be the result, but was still hard apple cider.
