Sport show appeals to outdoor people

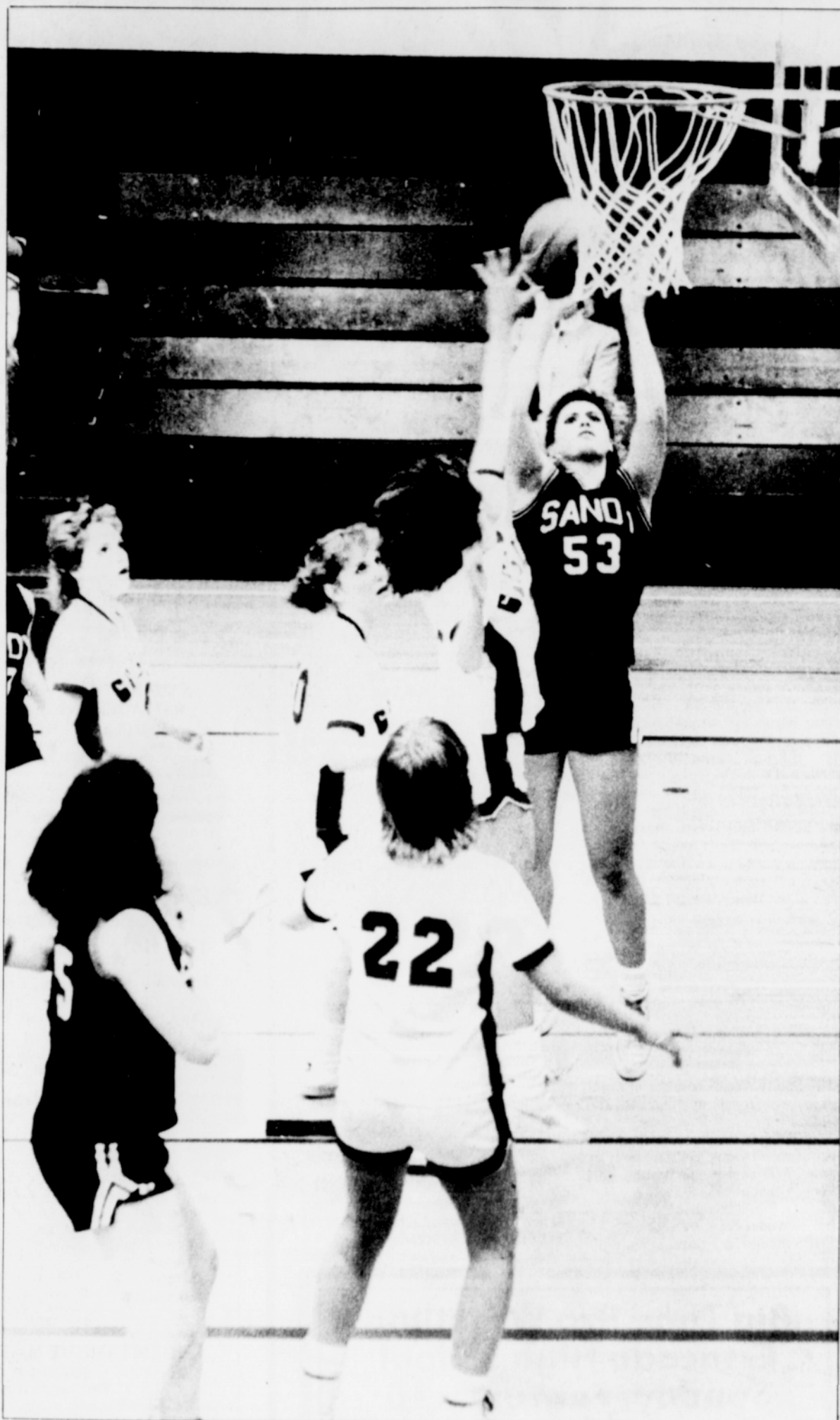

Hunting and fishing seminars will include such speakers as Kirt Darnier, Coloradoan with nine mule deer trophies in the Boone and Crockett record book, and expert fishermen Jeff Boyer, bass; Bill Marts, fly fishing; and Jim Conway, steelhead, and Gary Roach, walleye.

Show hours are 6-10:30 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday; 1-10:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday and 1-6 p.m. on Sunday.

Admission is \$4 with seniors admitted for \$3 and children 6-16 for \$2. Children under 6 are admitted free.

Remain unbeaten

Steady play powers Sandy

Staying true to form, the Sandy High girls basketball team pulled out another victory in the fourth quarter over Gresham 54-49 Thursday night to remain undefeated and atop the Mt. Hood Conference.

Although the Gophers played their best game to date, according to Gresham coach Rick Bartha, the consistent play of the Pioneers in the fourth quarter gave Sandy the five point margin needed to win.

"This team has shown a lot of character this season, and has had a lot of close games, but always finds a way to play down to the end to win," said Sandy coach John Smith.

Wendy Heckard lead the charge in the fourth quarter sinking two quick 15-foot jumpers from the top of the key with 3:58 remaining to give the Pioneers a three point lead 42-39 which they never relinquished.

The Pioneers further showed their

character and poise hitting six for eight free-throw attempts in the last two minutes of play.

In addition to Sandy's consistent play, Smith couples his teams success to his starters ability to fulfill a specific role on the team.

Smith outlined the role of his starters, beginning with center Wendy Coleman as the team's rebounder. Forwards Shanna Daniels and Coral Howell are cast as scorers, while point guard Heckard steers the Pioneers with her ball control. Rounding out the cast of starters is Christa Searls who sets the tempo on the defensive end of the court.

Smith is also pleased with the strong contributions made by center Chris Muff and guard Kenda Whitlock off the bench.

Sandy was fueled in Thursday night's game with the sharp-shooting

of Heckard and Howell. Both connected for 16 points. While Daniels chipped in with 14, Coleman got 4, Searls 2, and Muff added 2 points.

Sandy's match with David Douglas was postponed Tuesday night because of the inclement weather.

The tenth ranked Pioneers will travel to Troutdale tonight to square off against Columbia. Tip-off is slated for 7:30 p.m.

Complete dual season

Sandy swimmers set for district

The Sandy boys swim team will dive into the Mt. Hood Conference district meet Friday at Mt. Hood Community College to challenge reigning state champion David Douglas for the league crown.

The Pioneers will enter district competition sporting a 4-2 dual meet record against heavily favored David Douglas, undefeated after the dual meet season.

While Sandy coach Mark Smith has great confidence in his team's prospects at district, he does not anticipate anyone upsetting the Scots.

"David Douglas has some very strong swimmers, and they're going to be tough to beat — unless they drain the pool," said the Sandy coach.

Similar to David Douglas, the Pioneer's swim team has become a force to be reckoned with in the Mt. Hood Conference, explained Smith.

He said Sandy has been runner-up to the district champion every year the team has competed in the MHC, as well as holding impressive records in the other leagues with which they have been affiliated.

Leading the charge against the Scots for the Pioneers will be senior Matt Roth and junior Doug Crane.

Currently Roth is ranked fifth and sixth in the state in the 100 back and 100 fly, respectively. As teammate Crane is ranked second and sixth in the 50 free and 100 meter free, respectively.

Smith is also very confident the Pioneers 400 relay team consisting of Richard Rolph, Steve Kinney, Roth and Crane will get through the district and state meets and improve on their 3:25.2 clocking, which is currently the second fastest in the state.

While Smith foresees the boys nabbing third place or better at district, he says the girls will slate a fifth or higher finish.

"Our goal for the girls is to keep

them steadily improving, bringing their times down and bringing them up in the standings at district," said Smith.

Smith will call on the experience of five returnees: Donnie Terrell, Cristy Buck, Becky Hewgley, Terri Hanson and Tara Connelly to boost the girls up in the district standings.

Ultimately, the girls are looking to qualify for the state meet, ending a two year drought.

The Pioneer boys team completed the dual meet season with back-to-back victories over Gresham and Parkrose, as the girls completed the dual season in third place at 4-2, dropping to the Gophers and beating Parkrose.

The Pioneer girls salvaged five personal records in a 58-95 loss to the Gophers, as the boys were in total command of the Gophers setting 13 PR's in route to a 105-50 victory.

Against Parkrose, Smith was pleased to see his girls set five new personal records during a 93-57 win.

Jessica Montgomery captured two new PR's in the 100 and 200 free, while teammates Heather Frank, Carmen Monnison, Terrill, and Hewgley also grabbed new records.

David Hayball collected three new personal records in the 50 free, 200 free and the 400 free relay as the Sandy boys steamrolled over Parkrose 97-59.

Smith expects the competition in the boys district meet to be one of the strongest in several years.

The district meet is set to open with preliminary competition beginning at 5 p.m. on Friday at Mt. Hood Community College. There will be an admission charge of \$1 for students and \$2 for adults.

The state meet will also be held at the MHCC pool on Feb. 15-16, with preliminary competition beginning at 1:30 p.m.
