Woman set for competition

Elizabeth McCormick of Sandy will be competing for a \$950 scholarship on Saturday, March 2 at Gladstone High School.

McCormick, 18, is competing in the Miss Willamette Valley Scholarship Pageant.

A senior at Sandy High School who is also taking classes at Portland Community College, McCormick said she would like to be a veterinarian's assistant and will study equine medicine. Having had a hand in breaking all nine of the family's horses — including a wild appaloosa stallion — that goal doesn't seem unreasonable.

McCormick has only been bucked off a horse once. "I usually hang on," she said, "and hang on for dear life."

Asked the key to breaking a horse, she said, "You've got to win their confidence. It takes a lot of time."

McCormick has been showing horses for about 10 years.

She said the judging for the Miss Willamette Valley Scholarship Pageant will be based on an interview, a speech, evening gown and bathing suit competitions, and talent.

Her talent presentation is a gymnastics routine to "Chariots of Fire." She said her routine symbolically depicts the birth of a foal.

McCormick has five years of gymnastics experience, and has participated in a number of different sports. She has also participated in 4-H for seven years.

She said a number of local businesses have sponsored her by purchasing advertising for the program.

Group seeks host families

The American Scandinavian Student Exchange (ASSE International) is seeking local families to serve as hosts for 15 Scandinavian, German, Swiss, British and Dutch high school students who are part of the ASSE exchange visitor program, according to Susan Hayes, western director for ASSE.

The non-profit ASSE is affiliated with the Swedish and Finnish departments of education and is officially designated by the U.S. Information Agency as an exchange visitor program.

The students, 16 and 17 years old, are fluent in English and are carefully selected for the program based on

their high school performance, good character and interest in the ASSE program.

All of them are covered by comprehensive medical and liability insurance and have adequate money for personal needs supplied by their parents. The host family furnishes meals and housing.

The ASSE program offers families the opportunity to share North American cultural and educational experiences with a European young person and, at the same time, to learn about another culture and language.

Hayes said a volunteer area representative, provided by ASSE,

will contact the host family and the guest student on a regular basis to assure that everything is going smoothly.

ASSE also offers qualified North American high school age students the opportunity to spend a school year or summer living with a European family while attending school and learning about the culture and language.
