Symphonic choir to honor composers

On March 16 at 8 p.m. and on March 17 at 4 p.m. at the first United Methodist Church, 1838 S.W. Jefferson, Portland, the Portland Symphonic Choir will celebrate the birthdays of three major baroque composers, Bach, Handel and Schutz.

Bruce Browne will direct.

One of the Bach works to be performed will be "Komm, Jesu Komm," a motet for double choir and

continuo. Also to be performed is the well-known Cantata 140, "Wachet Auf."

The two Handel works featured show the two sides of the composer's religiosity. The Dettingen "Te Deum," from the liturgy of the Church of England, reflects Handel's activity in England and with that church. The earlier "Ach Herr, mich armen Sunder" is a cantata very

much in the German/Lutheran tradition.

Heinrich Schutz also contributed to the German musical tradition by the use of double and triple choir stereophonics. This technique will be heard in the "Uppsala Magnificat," which is for two choirs, four soloists, and instrumentalists. "Saul," the story of the conversion of Saul of Tarsus, is set for the same medium.

Soloists for these concerts include Lawrence Fee and Bryn Gillem, first- and second-place winners of the 1984 Portland Symphonic Choir competition. Also featured are LeaAnne DenBeste, soprano; Cameron Herbert, soprano; Melody Boyce, mezzo-soprano; Gracie Butler, mezzo-soprano; Daryl Browne, alto; Deborah Fetrow, alto; Delmar Barrett, tenor; Kit Howell, tenor; Daniel

Melvin, tenor; Mikkel Iverson, baritone; Steve Smith, baritone, and Paul Butler, bass.

Lyman Morse

A funeral was held Wednesday for Lyman "Fred" Morse of Eagle Creek. The service was held at Bateman Funeral Chapel.

Mr. Morse died at his residence early Sunday at the age of 51.

He was born on Jan. 27, 1934 in Manhattan, Mont., to Delbert and Wilma Carlyle Morse. As a young boy he moved to Portland and attended James John Grade School and Roosevelt High School.

In 1951 he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force for four years. After his discharge in 1955, he returned to Portland and went to work as a boilermaker.
