The Mt. Hood Lions Club will sponsor a free rubella (German measles) vaccination clinic at the Lions Hall in Wemme on Wednesday, April 3 from 7 to 9 p.m.

Although rubella is generally harmless, it can cause serious complications for unborn infants if the disease is contracted by the mother early in pregnancy. Abnormalities affecting the ears, eyes, heart and

brain may be found in infants born to infected mothers. Any combination of these abnormalities is called Congenital Rubella Syndrome.

The state Health Division has designated 1985 as the year to achieve 100 percent immunization against Rubella in women of child-bearing age. All women in that age group who think they may be unprotected are invited to attend the clinic.

She said Sandy seems like a town in which one can get to know other people and yet it is not isolated like some other small communities.

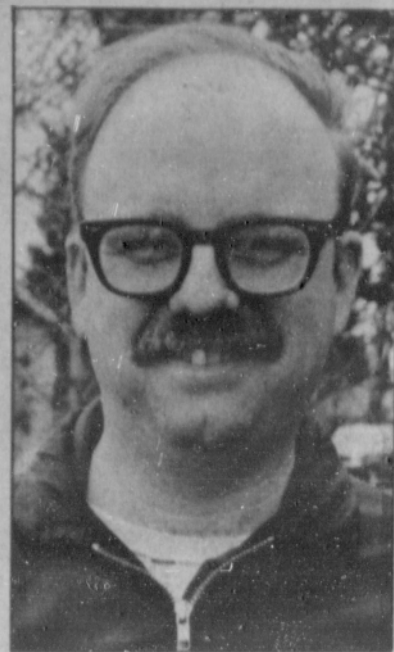
Williams sets April 4 debut for theater

By opening the Sandy Theater, Joe Williams will be getting back into a field he enjoys.

Williams works at the downtown Hilton Hotel as a security officer, a

trade he picked up during his four-year hitch in the Air Force.

Upon graduation from high school, he began doing theater equipment repair. Williams worked for Luxury Theatres as an assistant manager and manager. As a manager he was doing his own equipment repairs, and when it was discovered that he had that expertise, he was made repairman in charge of the whole circuit.

Williams will open the Sandy Theater April 4 with "Gulliver's Travels" and "Hoppy Goes to Town." He plans to stick with G, PG and PG-13 films. He said there were 106 such films made last year, "so it'll be no problem to run a double feature every week."

Teen-agers are the most profitable market for the movie industry, but

Williams thinks the reason for that, in part, is because they are making movies for that segment of the market. "From what I've heard, people want family pictures, and I'll give 'em what they want."

Double features will be shown Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays beginning at 7 p.m. The first movie will be shown a second time — following the second feature — so if a person went to the theater at about 8:30 he could still see both features.

Tickets will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

For the first two months, Williams will be selling discount ticket books. A book of 10 tickets for adults will sell for \$15. A book of 10 tickets for children will sell for \$9.

Tickets from the discount books will be good at any future show, Williams said.

The Sandy Theater has seating for 376, but Williams has already figured out how he could expand to two 306-seat auditoriums. He also said he would be willing to open every day if there is a demand for it.

Williams said it is expensive to get exclusive first-run films, but he said he will be able to keep a current inventory.
