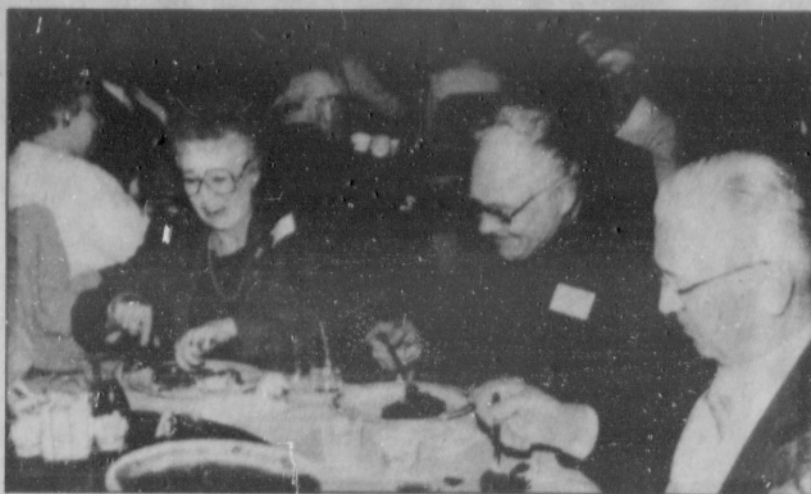
The deceased are Lorry Armstrong, Irma Aschoff Steele,

Swan resigns from top job at Clackamas bank

The board of directors of the Clackamas County Bank announced that it has regretfully accepted the resignation of Roberta J. ("Bobbi") Swan as chief executive officer.

Swan, who joined Clackamas County Bank in 1974, resigned to pursue other opportunities in banking.

During her tenure, the 74-year-old bank grew from \$11 million in assets to its present level of \$43 million — an increase of 381 percent. Other milestones in her career with the bank include the establishment of a branch office in Boring, a complete remodeling of the Hoodland office, and a renovation and 33 percent expansion of the main office.

On a per capita basis Clackamas County Bank has been among the most profitable Oregon banks in recent years, and posted record earnings in 1983 and 1984, according to information provided by the bank.

The bank enjoys a 7.1 percent capital-to-asset ratio — one of the highest in the state and "well above" regulatory requirements.

"I have enjoyed my association

with the bank and the community it serves," Swan said. "It is my intention to retain my residency in the area and to continue to be actively involved in the community."

Couple offers reward for two stolen saddles

A \$100 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties involved in the theft of two custom-made saddles from the home of Paul and Louise Spence, 20051 S.E. Bornstedt Road, Sandy.

The saddles were taken Saturday night from a barn on their eight-acre farm, according to Louise Spence. Both have the Diamond S brand on the inside fenders. One of the saddles is silver mounted.

They are valued at \$3,500 apiece, Spence said, but the loss is also a personal one. Before training as an auctioneer, Paul Spence attended a school to learn to make saddles. They were the first two saddles he made.

Louise Spence said they have not been in the custom-saddle business for years.
