

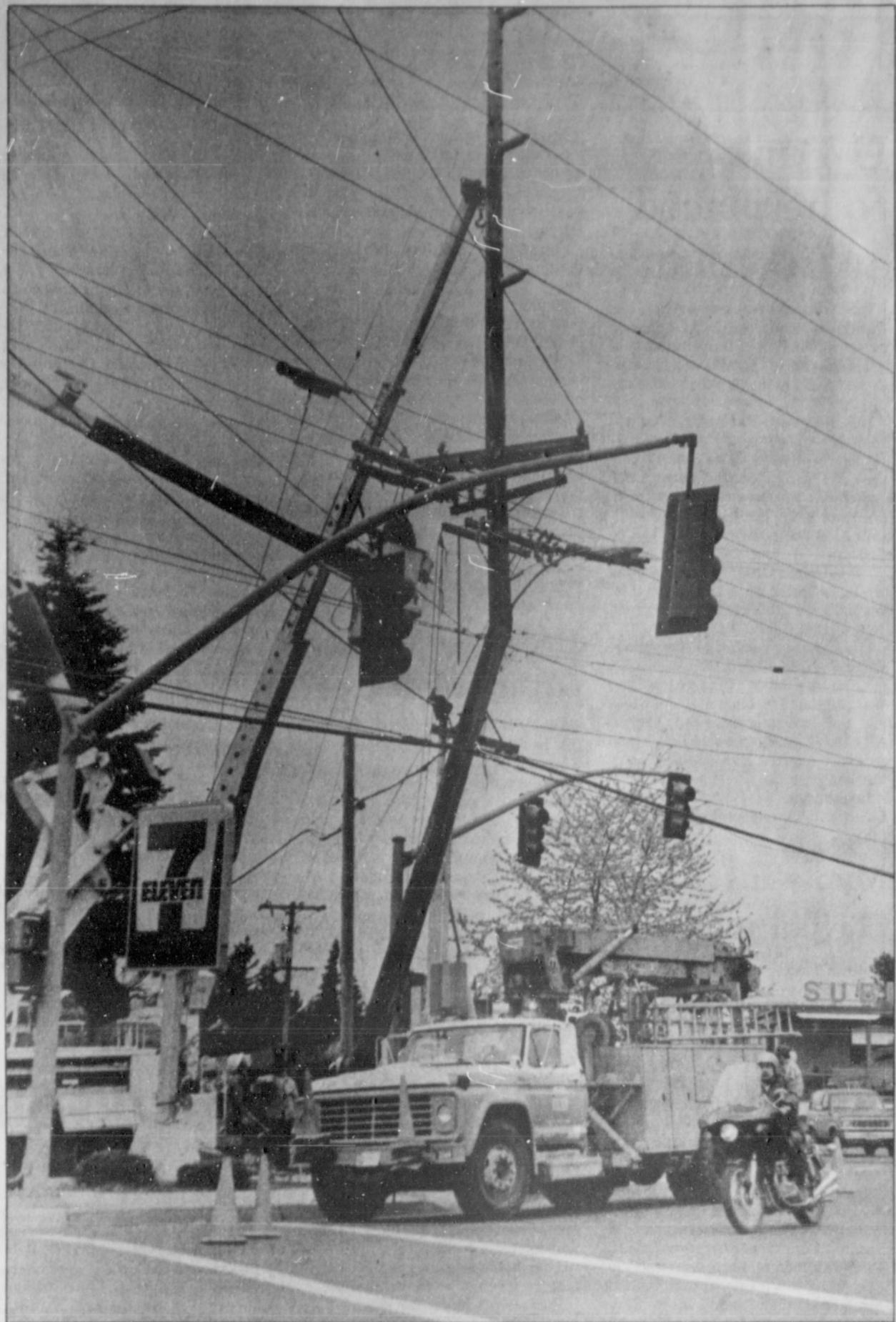

Man falls asleep; hits PGE pole

A Portland man fell asleep at the wheel of his car about 11 p.m. Sunday and hit a Portland General Electric high-line pole at the corner of Highway 26 and Ten Eyck Road, according to a Sandy police department report.

Michael David Davis of Portland, who reportedly is in his early 20s, was taken to Mt. Hood Medical

Center in Gresham. He received a broken leg, according to the police department report. A spokesman at Mt. Hood Medical Center said he was treated and released. A passenger, Linda Nelson, also of Portland and in her early 20s, was in "satisfactory condition" late Tuesday afternoon, according to the Medical Center spokesman. She received lacerations on her face and suffered a cervical fracture.

The 1975 Camaro he was driving was totaled, according to the police department report. There were no skid marks and speed at impact was reportedly about 55 miles per hour.

Dave Eagon, public information representative for Portland General Electric, said Tuesday he could not estimate the cost of replacing the 75-foot pole. The work was expected to take at least three days.

Damages listed at \$34,000 in Deming Road trailer fire

A fire at about 10 a.m. on Sunday, April 14 at 36520 Deming Road resulted in the loss of a 24- by 60-foot mobile home, according to Jim Gallagher, Sandy fire marshal.

Total damage to the trailer and contents was put at \$34,000. Gallagher said Everett Tiemann was attempting to get rid of ants, and poured white gas on the ground along the edge of the trailer. The fire quickly spread from one end of the trailer to the other, burning under the trailer, Gallagher said. Tiemann reportedly tried to fight the fire before calling the fire department.

At Welches School

Cook ready for retirement

After 22 years of service, she's a notable part of the talk at Welches School. Evie Trembly, head cook, is retiring this year.

The genial cook has worked almost all of her life. As she retires, she says she anticipates most "not having to work!"

The school has expanded since she began cooking in the old Welches School building in 1963. When she started, there were about 140 mouths to feed, now there are 260, including 15 senior citizens the school sends food out to. She began with one part-time helper, now there are two full-time cooks and one part-time helper. "It's grown," she said, "there are so many more students and faculty members."

Her favorite lunches to prepare include pizza and tacos, which are favorites of the students. Though the quality of the food hasn't changed much since she's been at Welches, the prices have. She remembers when lunch cost a student only 25 cents a day.

Good fortune has it that Trembly's husband, Fred, retired only a few weeks ago, which is good timing. They plan to sell their home on Arrah Wannah Road in Welches and buy a double-wide mobile home to place on property they own in LaPine.

The Tremblys have two sons and three grandchildren.

They are hoping to use their motor home more often now. One trip on the

Local woman drowns in pond

Patricia Louise Kelley, 41, of 43500 S.E. Marmot Road, apparently slipped while cutting weeds, fell into a pond and drowned on Tuesday, according to officials from the Clackamas County sheriff's department.

The Sandy fire department

responded to a call about 1 p.m. after her husband, Charles Luis, saw her hat floating in the pond and assumed something was wrong. Three firemen entered the pond and her body was found, according to Jim Gallagher, fire marshal.

Attempts to revive her failed, he said. She was taken to the Mt. Hood

Medical Center in Gresham by Alpine Ambulance and was pronounced dead upon arrival.

She had apparently been cutting weeds along the bank, which was "nearly vertical," Gallagher said. They estimate she had been in the pond about 40 minutes, he said.

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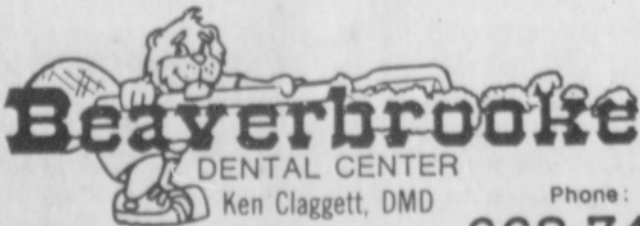
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
