

Diversion meets opposition

Two dozen state legislators, mostly from the Portland area, have signed a letter urging Portland City Commissioners to abandon plans to siphon off Sandy River water for hydroelectric purposes.

Rep. Rick Kotulski, D-Corbett, said Tuesday that it is no accident that most of the signers of the letter are Portland legislators.

"Portland City Commissioners may not pay much attention to East County legislators, but they should pay attention to their own," said Kotulski, who wrote the letter and sought out the signers. Signers included House Speaker Vera Katz, D-Portland, and Senate President John Kitzhaber, D-Roseburg.

Kotulski contends that plans to divert Bull Run River to hydroelectric generators in East County, dumping the water in the Columbia River, will harm the Sandy River which is fed by the Bull Run. He charges that the diversion is a violation of the Sandy River Scenic Waterway act which protects 12.5 miles of the Sandy.

Portland City Commissioners have delayed to mid- or late July a meeting on a Portland Water Bureau plan to divert 170 cubic feet per second of water from the Bull Run River for hydroelectric purposes.

Harvey Lockett, assistant to Commissioner Richard Bogle, said the reason for the delay is that the commission is waiting for the results of a

Sandy River fisheries study being done by a Colorado firm, Beak Consultants.

Kotulski is more inclined to believe that growing political pressure has caused the delay.

Commissioners first said they would discuss the matter in May, shortly after the water bureau completed a 10-day test of the turbine system at Northeast 162nd Avenue and Airport Way.

Kotulski invited people who are interested in attending the July City Commission meeting to write him at the Capitol Building, Room 474, Salem, 97310.

In addition to the matter of protecting a scenic waterway, Kotulski has charged that the electricity the water bureau plans to generate with diverted water is unneeded.

"We are in a time of power surplus," he said.

Opposition to the water bureau project has been growing since last summer when a group of fishermen and environmentalists sounded the alarm, claiming that diversion of the water from the Sandy could seriously damage wildlife and recreational values.

Opponents were unsuccessful in stopping the diversion in hearings before the Oregon Water Policy Review Board. The board granted permission for the diversion on April 8.

However, the water bureau has been told to delay permanent operation of the hydroelectric project until the Portland commissioners meet to discuss the issue.

The hydroelectric turbines are part of system of wells that the water bureau has dug along the south shore of the Columbia River to provide a back-up water system for Portland. When the turbines are not in use for pumping water from the wells, they can be reversed to generate electricity.

The hydroelectric features of the system cost \$1.8 and were installed before opposition to the project began to build.

Water bureau officials say they took all appropriate steps to have their system and the diversion approved. Opponents charge, however, that the bureau acted with little or no public involvement.

Tour of homes set

A few extra stops can be added to an afternoon drive this Sunday with the opportunity to visit five historic homes in the Columbia River Gorge between Troutdale and Bridal Veil.

The Troutdale Historical Society is hosting the drive-yourself tour from noon to 5 p.m. Sunday. The tour features peeks inside homes built early this century.

"We selected these as the most interesting historical homes," said Sharon Nesbit, historian with the

Troutdale Historical Society. "They've been restored and nicely kept."

Tickets will be sold for \$7 a person from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday at the Harlow House, 726 E. Columbia St., Troutdale. Each ticket is a brochure that gives directions to each home and a summary of the home's history.

Hosts will be at each home along the 27-mile loop tour that starts at the Harlow House. Four of the homes are along the Columbia Scenic Highway and one is on Larch Mountain Road.

The tour, which is being conducted for the first time, won't be done again for at least couple of years, said Nesbit.

"It's a once in a blue moon opportunity to see these houses," said Nesbit. "They're really special houses." Proceeds from the home tour will be used to restore the Harlow House.

vice agency in the Hoodland corridor, its services are not always limited to people over 60. From their office, cheese is distributed to low-income households.

The Senior Center is designated as a focal point of the Area Agency on Aging and aims to be a resource of in-

formation. There is a Rolodex with hundred of cards listing services available to Clackamas County residents.

Approximately 280 newsletters a month are sent from the center to people in the Hoodland vicinity, which extends from Cherryville to

beyond Government Camp.

Through the organization of Loaves and Fishes, the Hoodland Senior Center volunteers meet together with the Sandy and Estacada volunteers for peer support. Some of their time together is spent practicing listening skills, and learning self-awareness.

Kasserman credits a lot of the Hoodland center's achievements to the volunteers. Without them, she feels all they are able to do wouldn't be possible.

"We have a good set of volunteers," Kasserman said. "We try to get the community involved as much as possible."

The center's funding is from donations, fund raising and Loaves and Fishes. The meal programs are funded by Clackamas County Community Action.

Kasserman's task as Outreach coordinator is to connect senior citizens with services that will allow them to stay home as long as possible.

"In Clackamas County the approach to seniors and their independence is unique to the United States. To aid people to living independently is the main priority."

In the Hoodland area, transportation can be the main difficulty for seniors. Often, it is hard to find volunteers that can take people long distances. Some of the seniors have

to go to the U.S. Veteran's Hospital downtown.

Kasserman stressed that the Senior Center is not limited to any specific income level. The services are for all people in general.

"It doesn't matter whether you have no money or lots of money. If you get out of the hospital with a broken hip, you are going to need some assistance."

Kasserman has received a lot of appreciation from the seniors she works with, and would like to see more of the community get involved in their programs.

"I've made lots of wonderful friends," she said. "They are no different than any other age group, except that they're older."

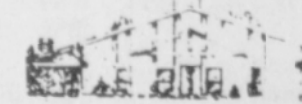
