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of the new system — including the easement and construction — will be about \$130,000, Mohill said. Not only is an easement necessary from Loving, but also from two other property owners, as well as the right to cross a state highway.

As an example of the misinformation that was going around, Mohill said one person asked him Saturday if they could stop boiling water. "There are no beavers in that 450 foot

well," he said.

A microbiologist told him the chances of the parasite going through the system, bubbling to the surface, and then infecting people are "pretty darn rare."

He also denies that raw sewage ever bubbled up. It was water with a "grayish film, dirty water," he said.

Mohill does feel they made a mistake in not disseminating enough information on their progress. Neither the manager of the trailer court or the management company had the time or resources to disseminate enough information, he

said.

After talking to Dayna Rich after the meeting, Mohill decided "we were probably mistaken by not getting enough accurate information in her hands."

Rich told The Post she could have used more information earlier. After asking Commonwealth Brokerage for the names of the owners of the trailer park, she was told to look it up at Clackamas County.

It took going to the media and a tenants meeting to get the attention of the owners, she said.

Rich disagreed about the sewage.

It was "black, gross slime," she said. Rich, her husband, and two young children suffered from giardia, as well as a 5-year-old girl from another family.

Members of the Rich family suffered from severe bouts of giardia, Rich said. One of the children had a loss of appetite, and the other was constipated. Dayna Rich, due to a bad reaction to the medication, vomited for six hours.

Asked if the ordeal could be described as extremely unpleasant, Rich said, "That doesn't even come close to it."
