Attention: Raspberry growers

Clackamas County raspberry growers are invited to the 1985 Red Raspberry Weed Control Field Day, which is being sponsored by the Oregon State University Extension Service.

The field day and tour will be at 2 p.m. May 28, beginning at the Wilhelm Heckel farm, 35563 S.E. Kelso Road, Boring.

"Weeds in raspberries are like past-due bills, they keep creeping up on you," said extension agent Erric Ross. "Of particular concern are perennial weeds like quackgrass and Canada thistle."

Ross and others will talk about control of these and other routine pest plants such as plantain, dandelion and yellow nutsedge. For the tour, Ross will use demonstration and research plots located on Kelso Road between Orient Drive and Bluff Road.

The tour will include both new and yet-to-be-registered chemicals as well as presently available products to control raspberry weeds. After visiting several trial sites on the Heckel farm, the tour will travel to Nagae Farms on Southeast Tickle Creek Road, south of Sandy.

BORING — Beth McIntire, 14, of Boring is heading to Japan this summer thanks to the Toyota Summer in Japan Scholarship Program.

McIntire, now a freshman at Sandy Union High School, was selected based on her grades and essays she wrote for the scholarship program. She was able to apply because her mother, Beverlee McIntire, works as a title clerk at Gresham Toyota, 950 N.E. Hogan Road.

The young McIntire will spend eight weeks with a Japanese family, learning about the culture and language in Japan. She doesn't know what city she will stay in, but her flight will land in Tokyo, said her mother.

"We're really excited here at Gresham Toyota that Beth won out of the region," said Beverlee McIntire.

"She's really excited. We've never won anything and we couldn't believe it."

The exchange program and Toyota Sales joined forces in 1975 to start the cultural exchanges. In those 10 years, 150 students have visited Japan.

Toyota Motor Corp. in Japan has started a similar program, allowing Japanese students to spend a year with American families.

The Toyota program is offered nationwide to children of Toyota employees through the auto maker and Youth For Understanding, a non-profit student exchange group that administers the program for Toyota.
