

MHCC president job finalist

Mt. Hood Community College President R. Stephen Nicholson is a finalist for the top job at Oakland Community College in Michigan.

Officials at the Detroit-area community college confirmed Tuesday that Nicholson is among five people being considered for the presidency of the school.

"The selection process is now under way. We hope to make an announcement by the end of the month," said George Cartsonis, director of college communications at Oakland, located 12 miles north of Detroit.

Cartsonis said Oakland, which was established in 1964, has five campus sites and 27,000 students. MHCC has 5,000 students, one campus in Gresham and a center in Maywood Park.

Cartsonis said the new president's salary will have to be negotiated. The position currently pays \$72,000, he said.

In April, the MHCC board agreed to extend Nicholson's four-year contract, which ran through June 1989, for one more year. In an evaluation

by the board, Nicholson received high grades for his relationship with the board, personnel relationships, educational leadership, business and finance, community relationships and personal qualities.

However, a faculty evaluation a month later said the college suffered a "leadership crisis" and said there were "significant" concerns about Nicholson's administrative performance.

Nicholson, 59, president of Mount Hood since 1976, earns \$53,500 annually. In addition, the college pays \$9,600 into an annual deferred compensation program, as well as \$6,000 in general expenses and \$4,800 in automobile expenses each year.

From 1963 to 1969, Nicholson served as a teacher, division chairman and academic dean at Lansing Community College in Lansing, Mich. For two years starting in 1969, he was president of what is now Daly College in Chicago.

Prior to accepting the MHCC post, Nicholson was president of Clark County Community College in Las Vegas, Nev., from 1971 to 1976.

Cartsonis said Oakland's 900 square mile district encompasses 1.5 million residents. "This is a very pro-

sperous and diverse area," he said. "We have large automotive plants as well as high rent suburbs and undeveloped land."

A 24-person task force — comprised of faculty members, administrators and school trustees — has been assigned the task of making the selection recommendation to the Oakland college board, Cartsonis said.

He said the board hopes to make its announcement prior to July 1.

Besides Nicholson, the other four

finalists are: Dr. Fred Gaskin, president of Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill.; Dr. George T. Miller Jr., president of North Western Michigan College, Traverse City, Mich.; Dr. Michael Paradise, chancellor of the University of Alaska in Juneau, Ala.; and Dr. Bill F. Stewart, president of Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Nicholson could not be reached for comment on Tuesday.

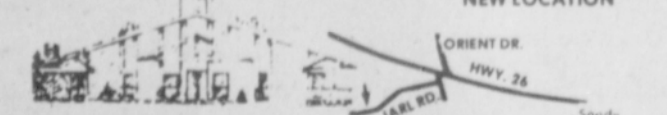
