

Class of 1985 reaps scholarships

A number of members of the Sandy High School class of 1985 have received scholarships or other honors. The following list has been compiled from information provided by SUHS, the State Scholarship Commission or press releases from colleges or other organizations.

The Oregon State Scholarship Commission recently announced its list of 1985 Oregon Scholars. The purpose of the award is to give recognition for academic achievement. These awards are honorary and are not related to financial assistance students may receive. Selection is based primarily on high school grade point average, with consideration given to aptitude test scores.

The 1,509 Oregon Scholars were selected from approximately 28,584 in the total 1985 graduating class. The six students selected from Sandy High were Jack E. Harris, Sylvia Hertrich, Lisa G. Lind, John O. Marosi, Valerie J. Master and Dennis R. Peetz.

Nine students were in the running for the Cliff O'Harrow Cup, which is given to the most outstanding senior at Sandy High. Jonelle Stroup received that honor. Other finalists were Master, Wes Wright, Tom Russell, Sarah Krick, Lind, Marosi, Chris Muff and Christa Searls.

The Sandy Alumni Association gave two \$1,000 scholarships. Recipients were Ivy Lewis and Amy Lynch.

The Sandy High board of directors gave eight \$500 scholarships. Recipients were Dina Betschart, Angie Conibear, Charisse Flatt,

Krick, Master, Stroup, Wright and Lind.

The Sandy High Booster Club gave five \$250 scholarships. Recipients were Charisse Flatt, Krick, Stroup, Master and Conibear.

Amy Lynch was the recipient of a \$300 scholarship from the Sandy Business and Professional Women's Club.

Susan Bowman was the recipient of a \$750 scholarship given by Clackamas County Bank.

The Future Business Leaders of America presented Monice Stricker with a \$100 scholarship.

The Sandy Fire Department gave its \$300 scholarship to Charisse Flatt.

The Forestry Club's two \$100 scholarships were given to Susie Maronay and Jeff Storey.

Lisa Lind, valedictorian, won numerous scholarships, including the local, district and state Elks Club scholarship, worth \$3,400. Among her numerous other scholarships, Lind received a \$1,900 Faculty Scholarship from Linfield College. Lind, who received a 4.0 grade point average, plans to major in psychology at Linfield.

Lind also qualified for a Lewis and Clark College Presidential Grant for \$1,000, and an OSU Dad's Club scholarship for \$500.

Recipient of the \$250 Kiwanis Club of Sandy scholarship was Bryan Zimmerman.

John Marosi was the recipient of the \$700 Pop Rannow scholarship.

Dennis Peetz received a \$100 scholarship from the Speech Club.

Three \$100 Associated Student Body scholarship were given to Stroup, Master and Krick.

Krick and Stroup also received the \$300 Superintendent's Outstanding Female Math Student scholarships.

The \$100 Wayne Johnson Memorial Scholarship went to Tony Barnes.

The \$300 Superintendent's Outstanding Male Vocational Student scholarship went to Jeff Abshire.

Wes Wright received a \$10,000 U.S. National Bank work-study scholarship at Linfield College.

Sarah Krick won an Elks Club scholarship for having been runner-up in the local competition. The scholarship is worth \$300. She also received a National Society Daughters of American Revolution scholarship for \$300.

Dennis Peetz received a four-year, Navy ROTC scholarship.

Food distribution set at Action Center

Butter, cheese and flour will be given to low-income families in the Sandy area on Saturday, June 15 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Sandy Community Action Center.

People who wish to receive the USDA commodities should take two pieces of identification, listing their current address, to the Action Center.

Commodity distribution will also be provided at the Women's Club building on Salmon River Road in

Wemme, and at St. Aloysius Church, 2nd and Broadway, in Estacada.

A family of four with a monthly income of \$1,154 would qualify for the program.

Commodities to be distributed, for a family of from one to four, will be one 5-pound brick of cheese, one 5-pound bag of flour and one 1-pound block of butter, according to Maggie Spannaus, area coordinator for Sandy-Boring and a member of the Action Center board.

State 4-H advisers set

Several volunteer 4-H leaders, older 4-H members and Extension Service agents have recently been appointed to state 4-H committees, according to Duane Johnson, state 4-H leader with the Oregon State University Extension Service.

They are joining more than 270 other 4-H leaders, older youth, Extension staff members and other OSU faculty members on the 16 commit-

tees that serve in an advisory capacity to the state 4-H office, Johnson said. Most appointments are for three-year terms.

Serving on the new 4-H state shooting sports development committee is Bob Townsend of Sandy. The committee is working with such 4-H projects as archery, gun safety and marksmanship.

Grand marshal named

Margie Boule, host of KATU-Channel 2's A.M. Northwest, will be the grand marshal of the Sandy Mountain Festival parade, according to Roger Atkins, Festival committee

member. Atkins said Boule was "rated pretty high" on their list of potential candidates for the honorary position.

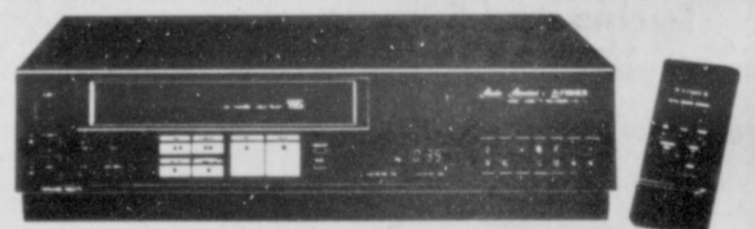

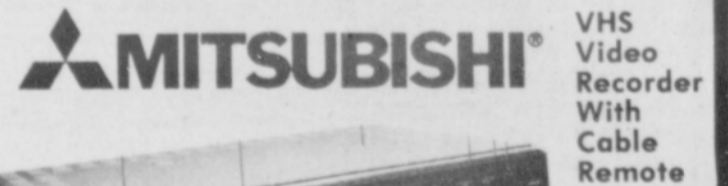
