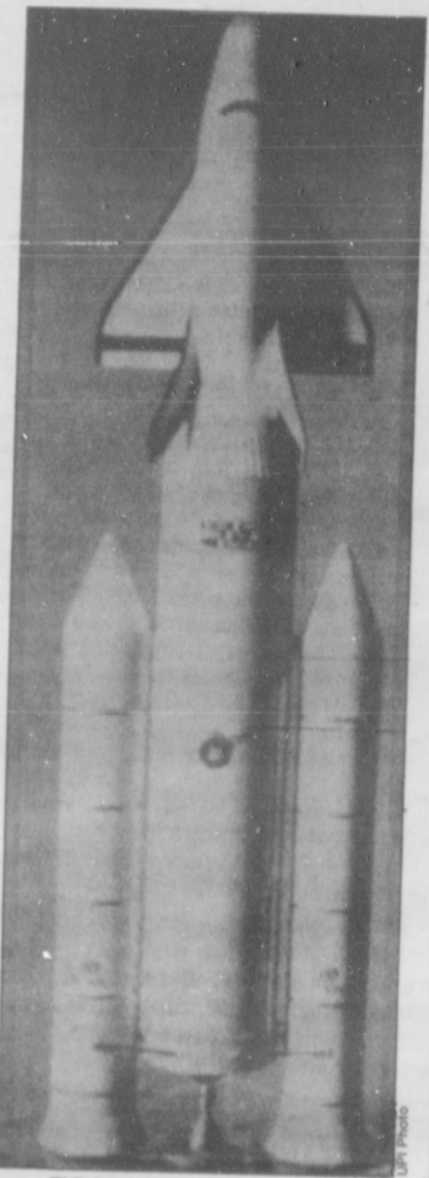

ESA's Ariane rocket

The United States and the Soviet Union are no longer the undisputed superpowers in the conquest of space. The European Space Agency, ESA, has recently emerged as a force in the commercialization of space.

ESA was established in 1975 by 11 countries — Britain, France, Germany, Belgium, Denmark, Ireland, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland. Its biggest success to date is the Ariane rocket, which now has a backlog of 28 satellites to launch. Ariane is very similar to the U.S.'s space shuttle but is expected to cost less per launch than the shuttle.

In July, ESA plans to launch a scientific probe that will rendezvous with Halley's comet, one of the many

ESA projects that has American scientists watching enviously.

ESA has already sent into space a gamma ray observatory, an ultraviolet observatory and an x-ray observatory.

ESA also plans to launch a solar probe and a superaccurate star locator.

ESA Director George Van Reeth has been quoted as saying, "We started out as the younger brother. Now we are very much an equal partner. In some fields we are a leader."

"This partnership will develop future builders of quality, energy efficient homes..." said PGE President William Lindblad. In the partnership agreement, PGE will finance up to \$65,000 per house for purchase of a lot, materials, and permits. The schools, through vocational education programs, will provide instructors and student builders.

Ron Currier, Benson teacher and construction foreman for the first home, said "The kids will do everything except plumbing, wiring, and excavating."

After the houses are sold, the school districts reimburse PGE for costs. "Any profits are kept by the schools," according to Robert Hamill, Associate Superintendent of the State Department of Education.

During construction approximately 35,000 students will visit the Good Cents homes. Industrial arts and drafting classes will help in design. Home Economic students will learn about running an energy efficient house. At the time of sale, Business Education and Marketing students will be involved in the project.

Matthew Prophet, Superintendent of Portland Public Schools, said, "It's a living laboratory. Without PGE, the school districts wouldn't have access to this kind of technology for in-school learning."
