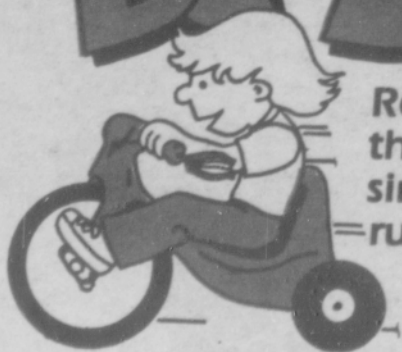

Parents feel better about letting you go places if you keep them posted about where you are going. Remember, if you stop at a friend's house, call and tell your parent where you are.

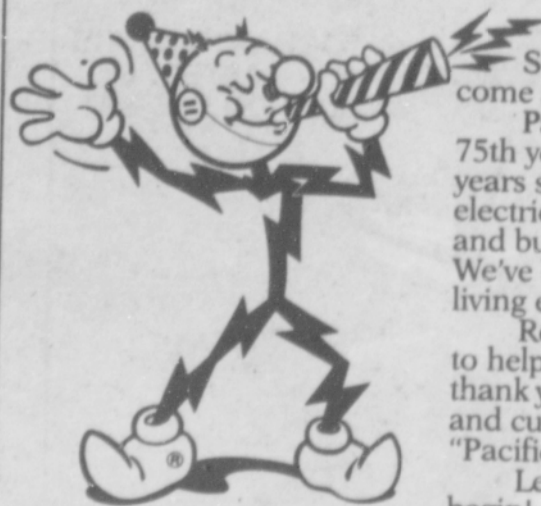


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
