Halloween events are planned locally

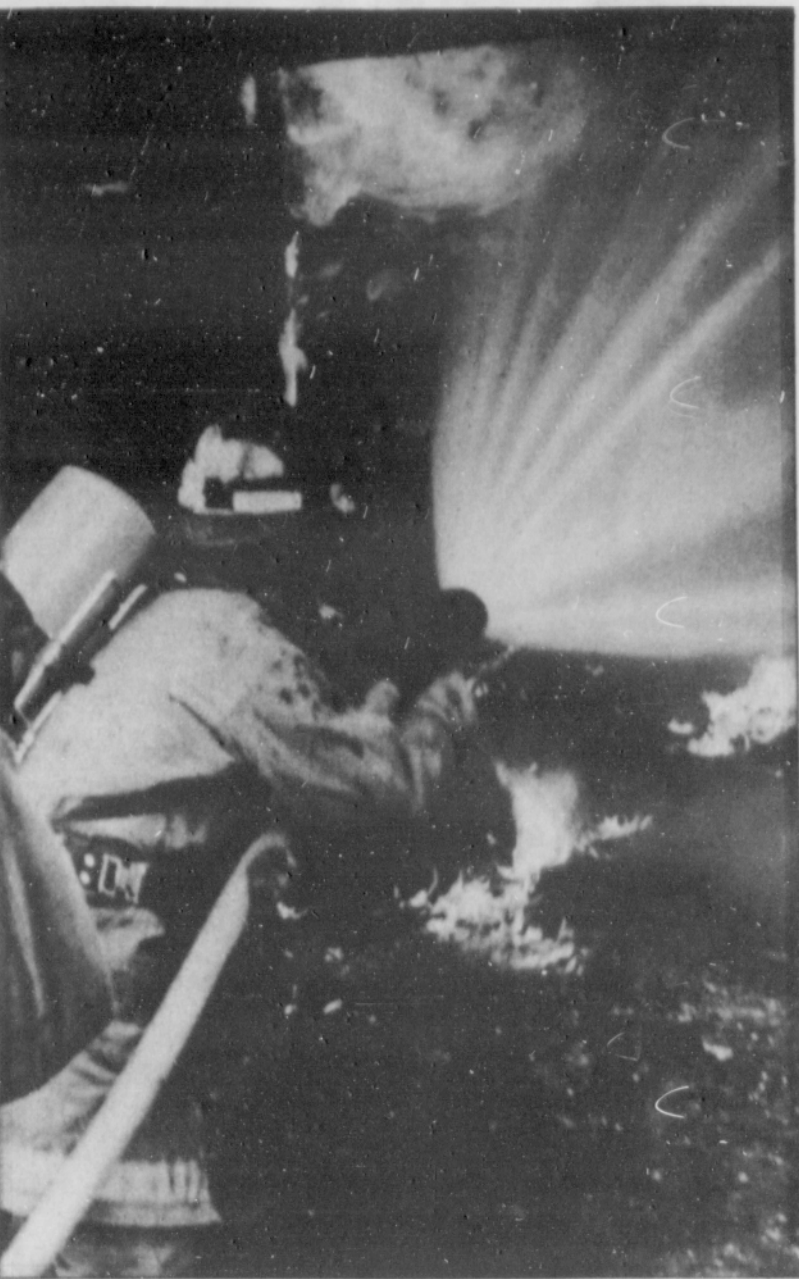
A number of activities are planned for Halloween night, as well as for the days preceding and following the spooky holiday.

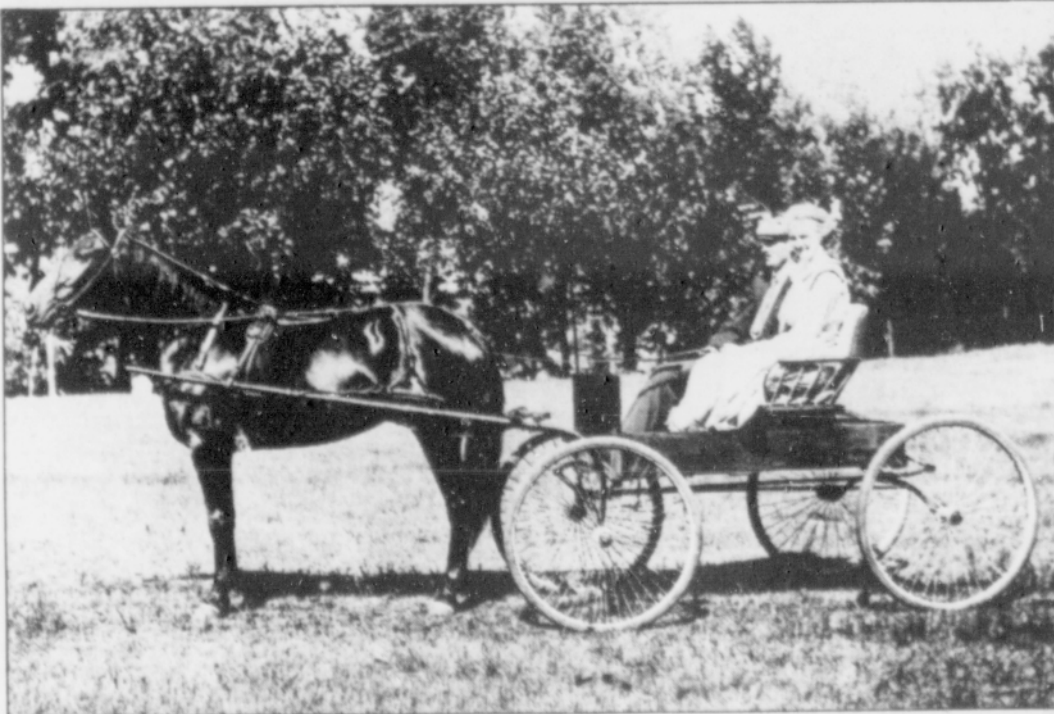
