won't get repaired until next summer. Since the building is not enclosed — it doesn't have a door — he would be in violation of the city code.

The section defines an inoperable vehicle as one that is not licensed and does not run. It would be unlawful for a person to keep an inoperable vehicle on private property for longer than a month.

Councilor Calvin Jones said he is in a similar situation with a tractor. It is in a shed with no doors, so it would not be enclosed. He intends to eventually get the tractor in operation, but not in the near future.

City Manager Tom Reber also had some concerns about the provision concerning logs. The ordinance gives people 60 days to cut logs into firewood. While that works in West Linn, where this ordinance originated, Reber is not sure that is feasible in Sandy.

No one testified Monday evening in support or opposition of the proposed junk ordinance. "I don't see any groundswell of support that makes me want to go out and enforce it," Reber said of the ordinance.

He said in the past couple of years there have been three or four complaints about junk and inoperable cars.

Frederickson supported the idea of some kind of ordinance. "I think we have to do something," she said.

The City Council directed Reber to come to the next meeting with a modified version of the ordinance.

In other business, an attempt to replace former councilor Randy Oliver, who has moved out of the city, ended in a deadlock. Applicants for the position include Brad Picking, developer and owner of Janz Beryla d, Michael Murray, a fireman in Boring, and Donn Christiansen, who works for the Gresham Area Chamber of Commerce but lives in Sandy.

All three told the council they favor planned, controlled growth.

After an executive session — the appointment of a City Councilor is

Calf sale planned for 4-H, FHA members

Ownership of up to 50 quality calves will change hands Saturday, Nov. 9 as Clackamas County's second annual Club Calf Sale is held at the Clackamas County Fairgrounds in Canby.

Unlike last year's sale, which took two days, the sale this year starts with the 9 a.m. entry and weigh-in and ends with the sale starting at 3 p.m. the same day.

According to Daryl LaClef, Canby area stockman and sale chairman, this second annual calf sale, sponsored by the Clackamas County Stockman's Association (CCSA), should generate more participation because buyers and sellers can concentrate all their energy into one

day. LaClef said, "We will leave a group of high quality, preconditioned calves available for 4-H and FFA members. All the calves will be evaluated by a sifting committee, each will be accompanied by a health certificate and all will be halter broken."

All calves will be sold by the pound at the auction cried by Mark Nestlen, Canby auctioneer.

Dan Ten Eyck, Sandy area stockman and CCSA president, said "The main purpose of the sale is to help the youth in Clackamas and nearby counties obtain healthy, high quality animals at competitive prices for their club projects."
