At McCrank's Dining Room

Down home describes food

Leonard and Raeline Guy intend to run their restaurant in a manner as down-to-earth as they are. They own Mary McCrank's Dining Room at the Ivy Bear, which opened in September.

The menu offers "down home American food like pan-fried chicken," said Leonard Guy.

All of the bread, jellies, pies, soups and salad they serve are homemade. "We use no preservatives," said Guy.

Mary McCrank's has a background of 50 years in business. The first — and only other Mary McCrank's restaurant — is in Chehalis, Wash. The Guys were partners with the original owner of the first restaurant until last year, and are now owners of both restaurants.

They split their time between their ZigZag and Chehalis homes. They have owned their home on the mountain for three or four years. They have been married for 10 years and have two teenage children.

With a "kind of mountain type" atmosphere, the menu prices range from \$5.95 to \$8.95 with "no extras," unless one orders wine or beer. Everything is included from the salad, soup and homemade bread to the beverage and dessert.

When Guy says fresh — he means fresh. That includes their seafood. "We bring it down from Olympia," he said. "We get our oysters fresh from the oyster bar."

A person can also enjoy the aroma, in part because of the no smoking rule. "We're 100 percent 'no smoking' because when you come in here we want you to smell the food and not nasty cigarettes," said Guy.

What of the well known, now toppled ivy bear resting on its side, the area's long-time landmark? "We have a guy started on it right now," said Guy. The task is taking longer than he expected, though. After 30 years, "the wooden poles gave up," and once the ivy is stripped off, the bear will be rebuilt from the bottom up, using the same ivy.

Mary McCrank's Dining Room is open Tuesdays through Saturdays from 4 to 9 p.m., and Sundays from 4 to 8 p.m. Reservations or "walk-ins" are acceptable.

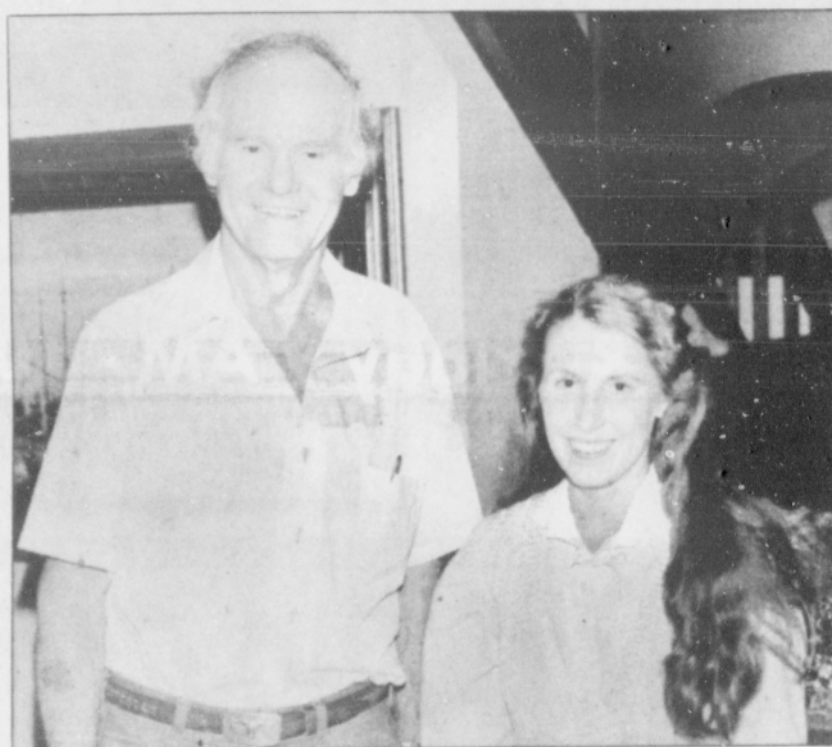

Sno-Park permits on sale

Oregon Sno-Park permits are now on sale in all Motor Vehicles Division field offices, many ski areas and winter recreation resorts, and sporting goods stores.

The permits are required on vehicles parking in areas posted as "Winter Recreation Areas" between

Nov. 15 and April 30. Fines for non-compliance can cost up to \$10.

"Winter Recreation Areas" include most downhill and cross-country ski areas and snowmobile trailheads.

Permits are sold for \$9 a year or \$2 a day.

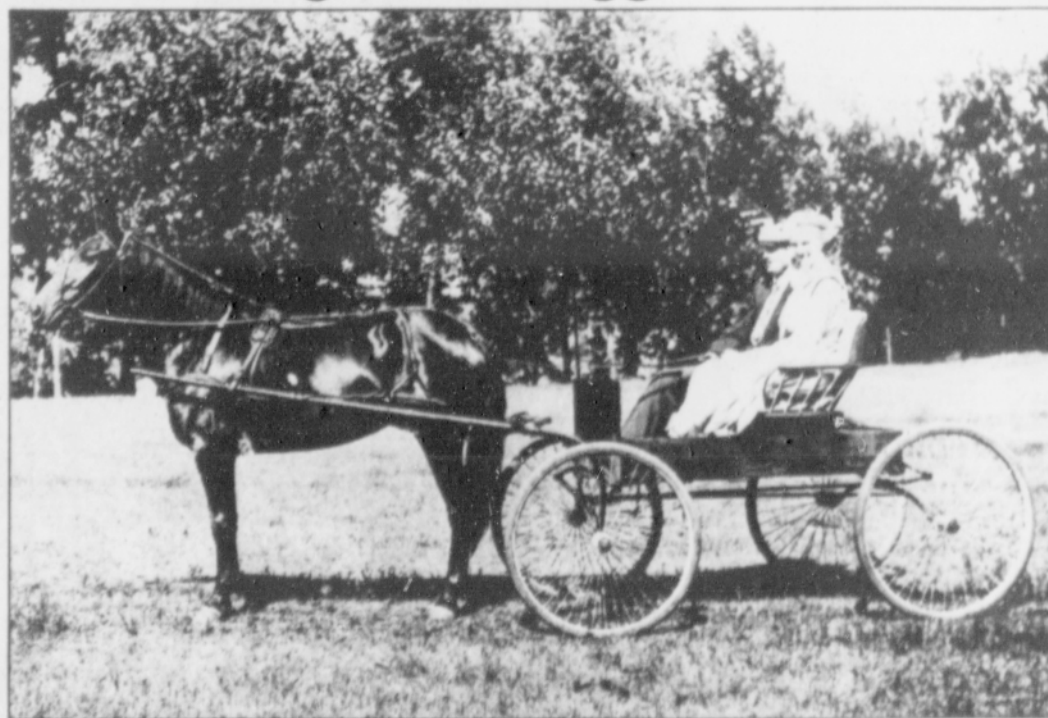
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
