SCIATICA

This abnormal condition is very common, yet it is not thoroughly understood by the average layman. Sciatica is essentially an abnormal condition of the great sciatic nerve which passes to the tissues of the thigh and lower leg. The sciatic nerve is about as large around as your thumb and is the largest nerve in the body.

ESSENTIAL CHARACTERISTIC

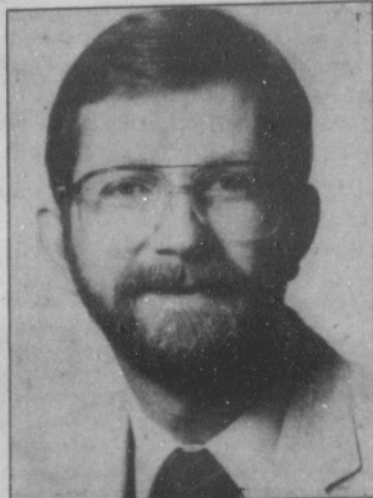
The essential characteristic of this condition is that of pain in the lower back, hip and leg. The pain may be the result of inflammation of the sciatic nerve fibers which have their peripheral termination in the sciatic nerve. For this reason sciatic may be classified as either neuritis or neuralgia.

If the condition is neuritis, it is marked by congestion, swelling, redness and pain in the nerve substance. Such a condition gives rise to a marked degree of pain. As it progresses, the pain becomes less pronounced and the congestion is gradually eliminated by the overgrowth of connective tissues which binds the nerve fibers together and the contraction of this connective tissue. When the contraction has taken place sufficiently, it also produces compression of the nerve filaments which it contains. For this reason the carrying capacity of these fibers is decreased, and the effects caused marked diminished nerve function.

GRADUALLY PROGRESSES

Motor nerves transmit vital energy in the form of motor impulses. If impinged, the condition is that of partial paralysis, which gradually progresses until complete paralysis results.

If the motor fibers are involved, the muscular weakness and final paralysis

are accompanied by a decrease in the size of the muscles in the lower limbs. An atrophy exists and the size of the two lower extremities is not equal.

If it is the sensory fibers that are affected, until there is complete loss of sensation of the leg, the limb is insensible to heat, cold, pressure and other impressions which can only be felt if the nerves of sensation are normal in their carrying capacity.

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We have determined what changes occur in the nerve tissue during sciatica. The sciatic nerve fibers can be impaired only when an interference exists upon them, and the only place an interference can exist is where the nerve passes between the bony segments of the spinal column. If a vertebrae is in abnormal position, pressure is produced on the nerve. Only chiropractors are trained in manipulation to remove the pressure causing the problem.
