Why Recycle?

Recycling saves energy, conserves valuable resources, and is good for the environment.

What and how can I recycle?

Glass
Bottles and jars only! Clean and sorted by color: green, brown, or clear. Labels do not have to be removed, but no metal lids, window glass, pyrex, china or light bulbs.

Newspaper

Tie papers in bundles or place in paper sacks.

Cardboard

Flatten and bundle. Sorry, no wax coated cardboard, all wood, metal and wire must be removed. Brown grocery bags are also accepted.

Motor Oil

Used motor oil and automotive lubricants are accepted. Put in a closed, unbreakable container with a good lid. No transformer oil.

Tin Cans

Peel off the labels, remove tops and bottoms, clean and flatten.

Other Metals

All other metals: aluminum, copper, brass, scrap iron and steel are accepted.

Persons who haul garbage to the transfer station can reduce their dumping fee by separating the recyclable items from the rest of their load.

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
