

# Colorado man considers job offer

Michael F. Swanson, a Denver banker, has been offered the \$55,000 a year job as executive for Clackamas County administration.

The three county commissioners selected Swanson from among 114 applicants. The 114 was narrowed to three by a panel of citizens appointed by the commissioners.

Swanson, 37, is a senior trust officer for First Interstate Bank in Denver, Colo. He was the previous administrator for Adams County in Colorado.

The new executive is a native of Iowa and a graduate of the University of Iowa College of Law. Before working as county administrator, he was assistant county attorney working with planning and personnel.

Swanson has "an outstanding reputation for financial management and team building," said Clackamas County Board Chairman Dale Harlan. The commissioners also liked his legal training and experience with collective bargaining.

"Mike has five years of experience as chief executive officer in a large suburban county that also faces growth and urbanization problems

and has independently elected department heads like our sheriff, clerk, treasurer, assessor and surveyor," Harlan said.

After telephone negotiations with Swanson, the county mailed a contract to him. Harlan said he expects the new executive to accept within a week and be on the job in early April.

The salary is "at the low end of the

range the board had considered," Harlan said. That will help maintain Clackamas County's "low management costs."

"Our present administrative staff is only one-third of what other counties our size use," he said. "With a salary in the lower range and Swanson's strengths in team building, we can continue to rely a lot on the cabinet of department heads."

# Rose canes should be pruned now

Rose bushes in the home landscape will give their best blossoms later in the year if rose canes are pruned back now.

"Roses may need a light, medium or heavy pruning depending on the variety and stage of growth," says Ray McNeilan, Oregon State University Extension home gardening agent.

Pruning is done to maintain vigorous new growth, remove weak and diseased limbs, open up the plant to air and light, shape the plant to the desired form and to promote quality blooms.

"Prune out all old canes and crossing growth," says McNeilan.

For light pruning, remove about one-third of last year's growth. This should leave the remaining canes about 2 1/2 to 4 feet high. Light pruning is recommended for rambling and climbing types of roses.

For moderate pruning, cut the canes back to about half their length. Weaker canes should be cut back even more. The canes that remain should be 18 inches to 2 feet high.

Bush-type roses and hybrid teas often require heavy pruning. Cut the canes back to within six to eight inches of the ground. Heavy pruning keeps the new wood close to the ground so the bush does not become leggy. It also keeps the flowers near the ground. Always prune back to just above an outward facing healthy bud.

In addition to old canes and crossing growth, prune out dead and diseased limbs, suckers (shoots rising from below the graft), lopsided branches and weak limbs.

# Catalog indispensable for home gardeners

Successful home gardeners plan before they plant, and one indispensable gardening planning tool is the seed catalog.

"Seed catalogs are a great help in locating the specific variety of vegetable you want to grow," says Ray McNeilan, Oregon State University home gardening agent.

Many catalogs also contain valuable growing hints and other good ideas listed with every vegetable variety included. Others are localized to provide variety suggestions for specific climate zones.

Vegetable varieties adapted to growing conditions in Oregon, or which have shown promise in gardens throughout the state, are listed in "Home and Farm Vegetable Garden," EC 871. Copies are 25 cents each and are available at county extension offices.

McNeilan suggests studying the list of recommended vegetable varieties. Some of them may be available at local garden stores, but others will have to be obtained

through seed company catalogs. More information on seed catalogs is available at garden stores.

# Hood View Academy evaluated

During a recent school evaluation, which occurs every five years, a seven-person team commended the Hood View Junior Academy administration and staff for many outstanding programs, according to Dave Escobar.

# Trunks not safe for valuables

Smarter and better equipped thieves, not a major increase in incidents, have prompted a recommendation that valuables be left at home and not locked in the trunks of vehicles while enjoying a visit to a state park.

Steve Johansen, park operations manager, said new signs reflecting the change will be placed in state parks on a replacement basis in coming months.

Rather than suggesting that valuables be left in trunks or hidden compartments, Johansen said new signs will tell visitors that "Valuables are not secure in vehicles and we advise you to take them with you." Even better, he added, is to leave them at home if at all possible.

Johansen said there have been a number of reports of thieves being able to break into trunks of vehicles. Another problem has been that of visitors leaving purses or other items of value inside locked vehicles, either in plain view or beneath something. Windows can be forced open or broken in short order and the valuables taken, he said.
