Whitlock vies for Junior Miss title

Sandy's Junior Miss, Carleen Whitlock, left Sunday for Eugene to participate in Oregon's Junior Miss Scholarship Program.

Twenty-three high school senior girls from Oregon will compete for scholarships totaling about \$7,000. By presenting these awards to participants, the Junior Miss program seeks to focus attention on the constructive achievement of all youth, to stimulate interest and concern for excellence, according to Joan Miller, chairman of the Sandy Junior Miss program.

Judging at the local, state and national levels aims to determine the representative high school senior girl, the well rounded individual with the personality, poise, promise and perception to serve as an able spokesman for her generation.

After a busy week, the preliminary performance will be on Friday, Nov. 14, where each Junior Miss will perform her individual creative and performing arts presentation. They will also perform a physical fitness

routine in groups, and be judged on poise and appearance.

The final performance is Saturday,

Nov. 15 where the program is a recap of the previous evening and the scholarship recipients will be announced in all categories as well as the announcement of Oregon's Junior Miss of 1987. The winner will advance to America's Junior Miss in June in Mobile, Ala.

Both performances will be in the Silva Concert Hall at the Hult Center in Eugene at 7 p.m.

The 1983 Sandy Junior Miss, Mary Russell, will be lending her talents to the program by choreographing a special number for the Junior Misses and local Brownie group and is the lead singer for that number. Russell is also Whitlock's "big sister" for the week.

Also expected to participate in the performance in a "Former Favorites" number is Angie Conibear, Sandy's 1985 Junior Miss and Melanie Beckley, 1986 Sandy Junior Miss.

Whitlock will be doing a vocal presentation in the creative and performing arts category, accompanied by Tom Ten Eyck on the piano. Ten

Eyck will also do other piano presentations during the program.

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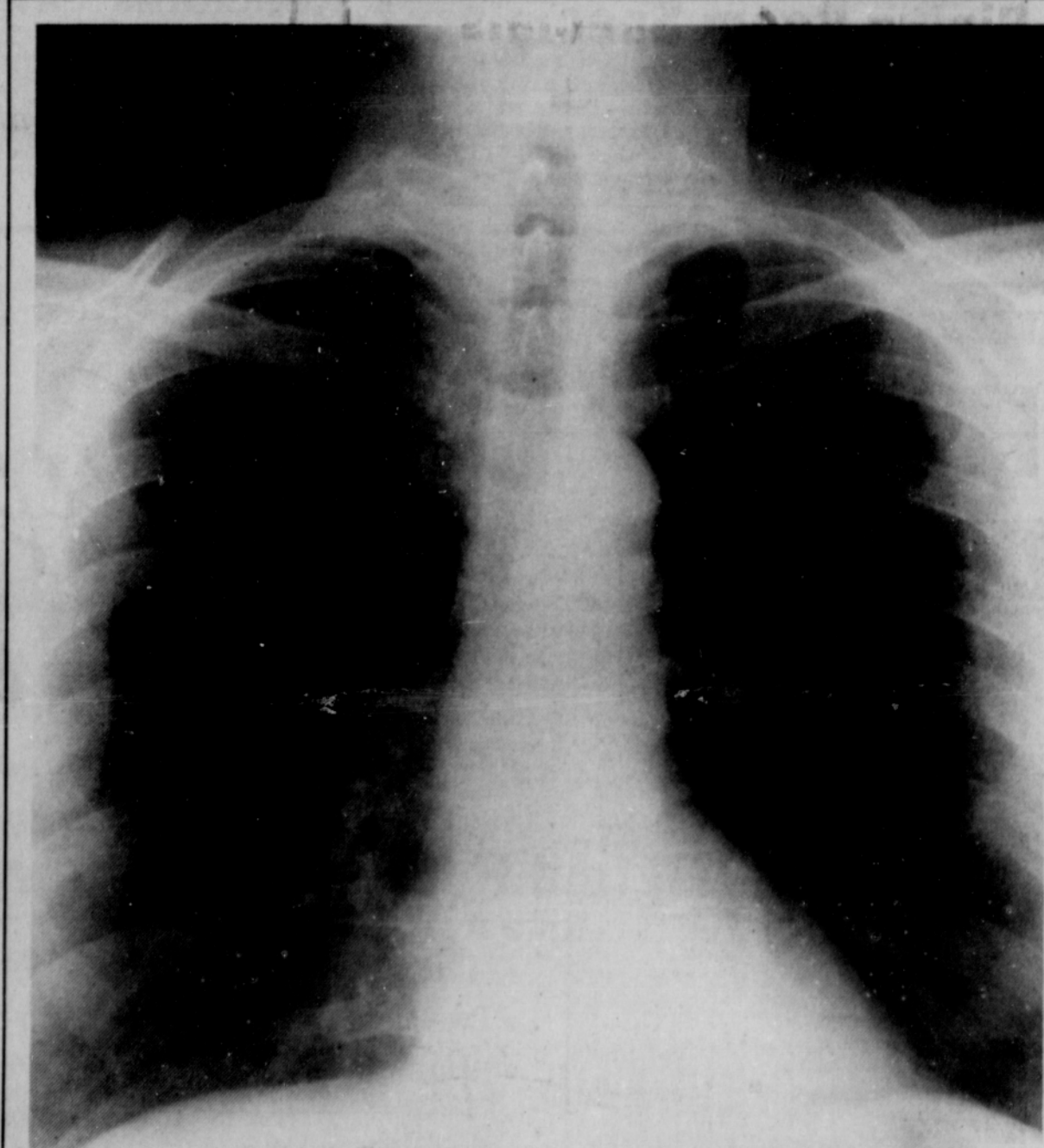
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
