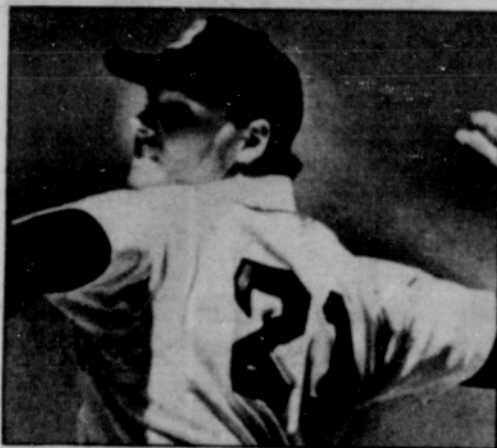
BASKETBALL

- Atlanta Hawks' ace dunker **Spud Webb** amazed everyone by winning the NBA's annual Slam Dunk Contest. Standing 5 feet 5½ inches, Webb performed reverse dunks, 360-degree slams and double-pump, two-handed jams. Webb scored his first dunk as a 5 foot 3 inch high school senior.
- It was a first for freshman players to be named MVPs in the NCAA men's and women's basketball tourneys. **Pervis Ellison** of Louisville and **Clarissa Davis** of Texas won the honors.
- Maryland's All-American **Len Bias** died two days after he was drafted by the Boston Celtics. The nation was shocked to hear he died from cocaine poisoning.



• Chicago Bulls' **Michael Jordan**, above, pumped in a record 63 points during Game Two of the Eastern Conference semifinals against Boston. In Game One, he had 49 points.

BASEBALL



- Boston righthander **Roger Clemens** struck out 20 Seattle Mariners. It was the first time for that many to strike out in a nine-inning game.
- **Reggie Jackson** hit his 537th career home run and moved passed Mickey Mantle for sixth place on the all-time home run list.
- Angels' **Wally Joyner**, 24, was the first rookie voted to the starting lineup in the majors' All-Star game.
- By his 22nd birthday **Dwight Gooden**, of the Mets, had pitched 13 career shutouts — a feat not thrown by some of the best.
- The Royals got **Bo Jackson** in the fourth-round baseball draft, but he was also the No. 1 draft choice for the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers and a fifth-round draft choice for a Continental Basketball Association team.

FOOTBALL



- Rams' running back **Eric Dickerson** upset NFL playoff records with 248 yards rushing against the Cowboys.
- Texas Christian junior **Tony Jeffrey** set an NCAA record of 21.4 yards per carry against Tulane. He rushed 16 times for 343 yards and scored five touchdowns.
- On September 7, **Marcus Allen** set an NFL record when he rushed for 102 yards — it was the tenth consecutive game he gained more than 100 yards. Walter Payton had the record with nine games.

- USFL teams were sacked. They were awarded \$3 after the NFL was found guilty of monopolizing pro football revenues. USFL star quarterback **Doug Flutie** made the best of the problem by signing with the Chicago Bears mid-season. **Jim McMahon** was insulted with the addition, but the Bears have needed Flutie with injuries plaguing McMahon and Mike Tomczak.

TENNIS



- **Martina Navratilova** won her fifth straight Wimbledon title, a record shared with Suzanne Lenglen who reigned from 1919-1923.
- Sixteen-year-old West German **Steffi Graf** won five tournaments this year, collected \$400,000 and beat both Navratilova and Chris Evert-Lloyd.

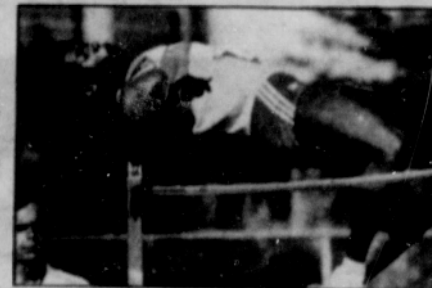


- **Boris Becker**, 18, was the second youngest man to win Wimbledon. Last year he was the youngest at 17.

HOCKEY

- **Paul Coffey**, Edmonton defenseman tied an NHL record, scoring eight points against the Detroit Red Wings.
- Hockey great **Wayne Gretzky** won his seventh consecutive MVP trophy in the NHL.
- Montreal Canadiens' goalkeeper **Patrick Roy**, 20, was the first rookie since 1971 to win the MVP trophy of the Stanley Cup playoff.

TRACK



- Track athlete **Jackie Joyner** was the first American to break the world heptathlon record and the first to collect 7,000 points at the Goodwill Games in Moscow. But she broke her own records at the Olympic Sports Festival. She set records in the javelin throw, long jump, high jump, shot put, 100-meter hurdles, 800 meters, and the 200-meter hurdles.

GOLF

- **Jack Nicklaus** hung a sixth Masters' jacket on his shoulders this year. It was his 20th major championship — another record.
- **Greg Norman** won a record \$650,000 on the PGA this season.
- LPGA star of the 80s **Pat Bradley** won enough this year to put her past the \$2 million mark for career earnings. She was also the first to win three legs of the Grand Slam.

MORE GREAT ATHLETES' FEATS

- **Greg LeMond** made world headlines as the first non-European to win the world's most prestigious bicycle race, Tour de France — a 2,543 mile race.
- A junior at University of California, swimmer **Matt Biondi** set world records during the U.S. World Trails in the 50 and 100 free and also won the 200. He was the first to win all three sprints.
- **Debi Thomas**, 18, was the first black skater to win the National and World Figure Skating championships. She defeated Olympic champ **Katarina Witt** on her way to victory.
