A play entitled "Just a Spoonful of Sugar" will be performed by members of Arts for Elders in cooperation with the Clackamas County Mental Health Department's drug awareness program on Monday, Feb. 2 at 12:30 p.m.

Senior participants involved in the project will demonstrate the problems of mixing over-the-counter medications with prescriptions and some solutions to help with a complicated pill-taking schedule.

Seniors will have a chance to test their knowledge of drug-related

issues following the show.

The center is sponsoring an extended two-week trip to the Southeast United States from May 10 through 23. Highlights of the trip will include visits to Washington, D.C., Williamsburg, Virginia, Chattanooga and Nashville, Tenn., and Atlanta. Cost of the trip is \$980 per person-double occupancy.

Call the center, 668-5569, to arrange for a free half-hour appointment. When coming in for an appointment,

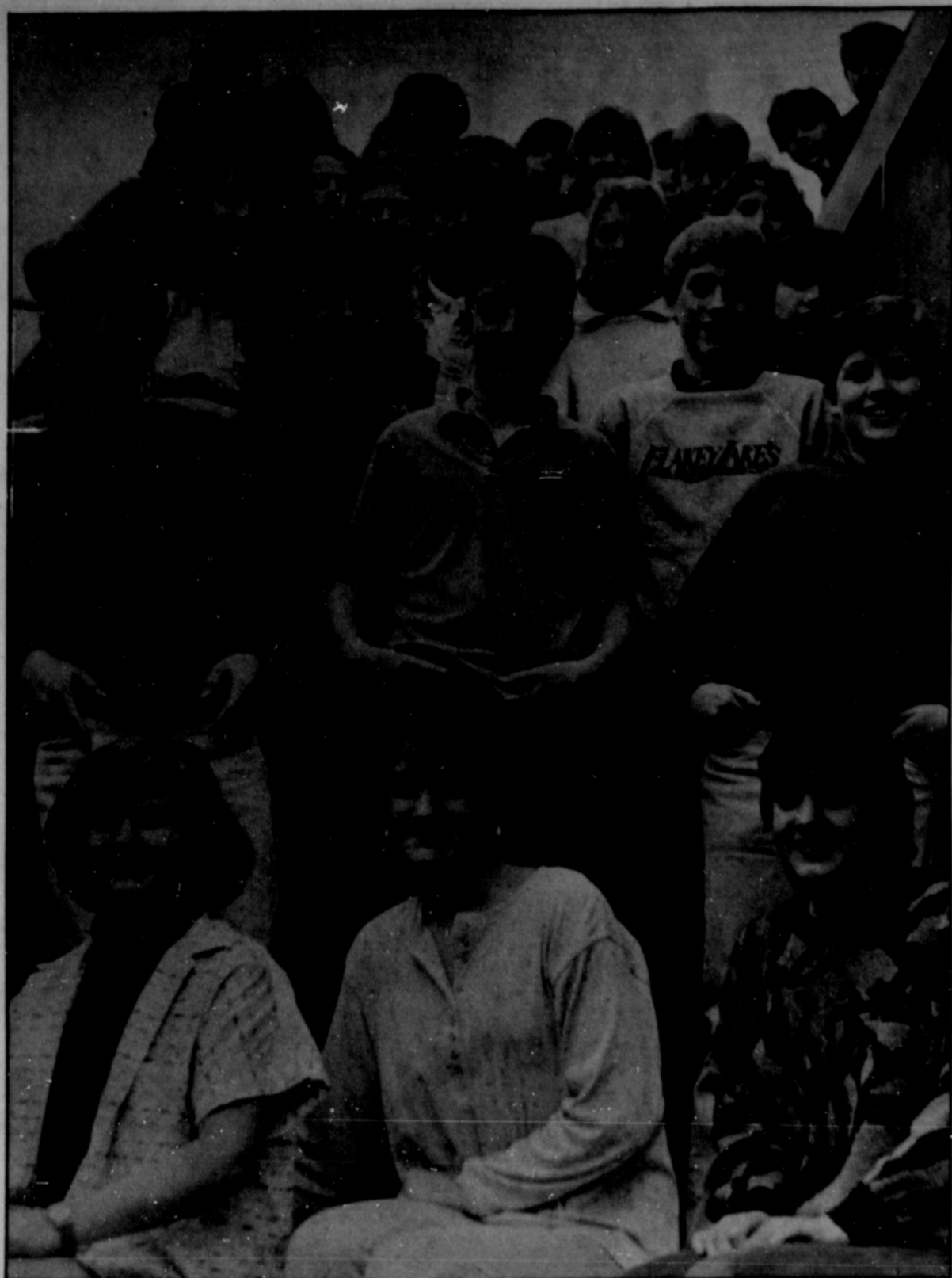

they must have an educational goal in mind and not just plan a trip for fun.

The district's talented and gifted program was eliminated in 1982 due to a fiscal crunch. The district had one teacher who visited the different schools to work with talented students. Shepherd said he hopes the honor society can help replace the talented and gifted program.

Members of the honor society said last week that they want more challenging math and science courses.

The students have a variety of interests. Jacob Polk would like to be an airline pilot, and Jennifer Thomas and Clayton Summer would like to be fighter pilots. Gavin Lindberg wants to be a psychiatrist, Kathryn Taylor wants to be a stockbroker and Shayne Jackson wants to be an inventor-scientist.

The students will seek membership in the National Junior Honor Society, which is sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

To get into the honor society, a student must have a 3.5 grade point

average. To remain in the organization, students must maintain a 3.2 grade point average.

Shepherd said other schools have found that honor societies encourage students with the potential to earn good grades to make an extra effort to do so.

"Once they see the activities and realize it is a lot of fun, they'll want to be a part of the group," Shepherd said.

"We have a lot of kids who can make it," he said. "We expect to see (the honor society) grow every term."

Lindquist named chairman

Commissioner Ed Lindquist recently was named chairman of the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners.

Lindquist, who replaces Dale Harlan in the position, will serve a one-year term.

Lindquist is a veteran of the county budget committee and the state Legislature, where he served for 10 years. He is a member of the National Association of Counties Transportation Steering Committee, which works with Congress on federal transportation funding.

Lindquist also is a member of the regional Technical Committee, which is lobbying in Salem for \$15 million to build the voter-approved convention center for the Portland metropolitan area.

A former member of the Ways and Means Committee, Lindquist also served on the State Emergency Board for five years.

"Federal and state cuts in county revenues and issues coming up in Salem that can affect the county make Ed's leadership and experience especially vital now," Commissioner Robert Schumacher said.

Shiprack heads labor committee

Clackamas County State Rep. Bob Shiprack, D-Beavercreek, has been appointed to a second term as chairman of the House Labor Committee.

Shiprack said the committee will handle "one of the critical economic development issues" facing Oregon during the 1987 session.

"Certainly a priority for the committee will be the Workers' Compensation program," he said. "We will look at the rate-making process, accident prevention and we will examine benefits as they relate to the rates."


Shiprack, who was re-elected Nov. 4 to a third term, was appointed to the post by Oregon House Speaker Vera Katz.
