Group to publish book of photographs

The Sandy Pioneer and Historical Association will publish a book of about 400 photographs of the early life and times of the area.

"We want people to understand this is not just Sandy," Charles Frasier said. "We want pictures from Government Camp as well as Boring."

The association also is seeking pictures from as far south as Eagle Creek and from the community of

Aims.

The group publishing the book includes some of the same people who published "Sandy Pioneers, Early Settlers and Barlow Road Days" in 1973, when Sandy celebrated the 100-year anniversary of the Sandy Post Office.

The book of pictures will be published to coincide with the city of Sandy's Diamond Jubilee. The city of Sandy was incorporated in

1913, 74 years ago.

Proceeds from the sale of the book will go to the group's museum fund.

"We promise to care for the pictures and return them safely," said Elizabeth Hartman, who was co-editor of "Sandy Pioneers, Early Settlers and Barlow Road Days."

Frasier said any early or particularly interesting photographs would be considered for publica-

tion. Even photographs taken as late as the 1930s could be of interest.

Members of the Sandy Pioneer and Historical Association will pick up the photographs.

The travel course includes a number of regular and special on-campus classes, as well as courses off-campus at seven locations.

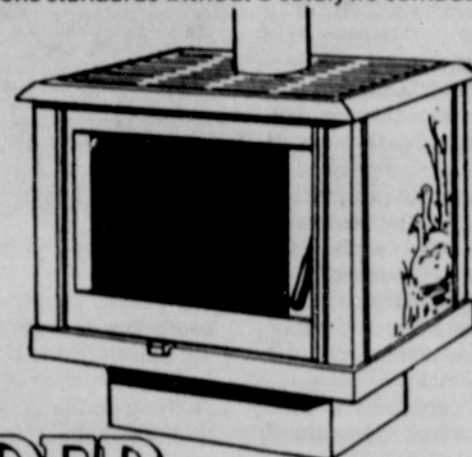
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New office to handle immigration applications

A legalization office will open in May to handle the flow of foreign-born citizens who will be applying for amnesty under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.

The exact locations of the offices will be determined at a later date.

The immigration act requires all employers to verify whether any person who applies for a job after Nov. 6, 1986 has the authority to accept employment.

However, the penalties for those who violate this act will not be impos-

ed until after May 31, 1987, said Carl Houseman, district director for the Portland office of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

"Employers should check now because after May 31, 1987, we'll be looking at every employee hired since last Nov. 6."

The new immigration law requires employers to verify whether applicants are eligible to accept employment in the United States. To establish their eligibility, applicants may show a document such as U.S.

Passport, naturalization certificate, Legal Resident Alien Card, citizenship certificate or foreign passport with employment authorization stamps.

Otherwise, they must show one document from each of two other categories such as a birth certificate, social security card, and a driver's license or other photo identification.

Employers must examine these documents from all persons seeking employment regardless of racial or ethnic characteristics, Houseman

said.

"The law applies to everyone whether they have white skin or brown skin; whether they speak with an accent or have a foreign-sounding last name," he said.

Residence hall jobs filled at OSU

Three people from Sandy who are attending Oregon State University in Corvallis have been selected to staff positions in residence halls on campus.

They are Joseph Betschart, a junior majoring in engineering, who is a resident assistant in Sackett Hall; Joe Rodriguez, a sophomore in pre-engineering, who is a resident assistant in Weatherford Hall; and Dina Betschart, a sophomore majoring in education, who is resident assistant in Callahan Hall.

About 2,800 students live in 11 residence halls at OSU.

Resident assistants attend 12 weeks of training and help enforce university policy, counsel students and oversee recreational and educational programs.

schools. Both schools have more complete electronics programs than Sandy, Sondenaa said.

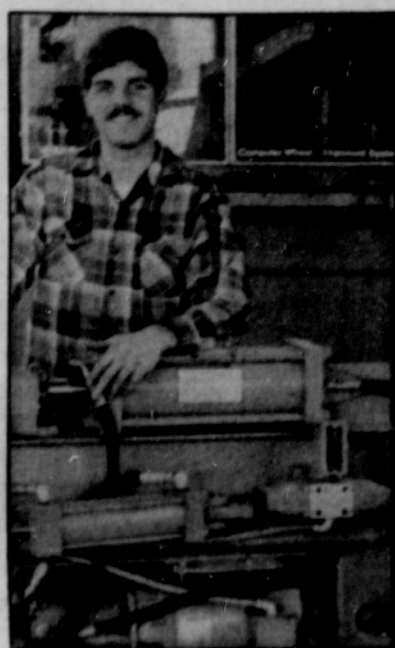
Carl Collins, a member of the audience, said did not want students sent to Clackamas Community College, MHCC or Gresham High School. "I'd like to have my kids right here," he said.

Collins also was not enthusiastic about the building construction class. "I don't see a whole lot of houses being built in Sandy," he said.

Ted Armstrong, another member of the audience, said he visited Curtis' class and students were learning the principals of lasers, fiber optics and robotics.

Armstrong said he talked to the manager of a General Motors training center in Tigard and was told that by 1990, "The need for mechanic-technicians with a background in electronics will increase 38 percent."

Armstrong said the board made up its mind before the meeting, and pointed out a curriculum guide for the 1987-88 school year does not list courses in electronics.
