

Students celebrate art tremor

Volunteers leave tired but happy

BORING — Portland has Art Quake. At Boring School, the unofficial name of the celebration of the arts is the Boring Art Tremor.

Ten programs were offered Friday at the 15th annual Cultural Arts Day in Boring. Patty White, co-chairwoman, said 49 volunteers left tired but happy at the end of the day.

Students at the school constructed cloth puppets, made personalized stationary with finger-print owls and learned the Japanese art of paper folding, called origami.

Fourth-grade students made silk screens of their own T-shirts in a session taught by Jeanne Lisak. Lisak operates a business out of her home called Cascade Screen Printing. She is the originator of the Boring Yacht Club T-shirt, which probably owes its popularity to either the "Boring" namesake or the fact that the only place to go sailing in Boring is at a septic drainage pond.

The T-shirt Lisak designed for the Boring School students has the school mascot on it — a bear — and reads, "Cultural Arts Day."

The design was fairly simple and took about 2½ hours to set up. Lisak compared the silk-screening process to using a stencil. She had a press set up and students only had to move a puddle of ink across the image, and then hang up the T-shirts to dry.

White, who organized this year's Cultural Arts Day with Jan Wiermina, said the Boring Parent-Teacher Association paid all expenses for the program.

Classes were offered for kindergarten students and first-through fourth-graders. Sixth-,

seventh- and eighth-graders helped the younger children find the correct class and ran errands for the art teachers and volunteers.

The younger children spent the entire day participating in Cultural Arts Day activities.

White and Wiermina began organizing Cultural Arts Day in October. They worked full time on the project last week.

White said all the work was worth it. She watched a videotape of some of the activities and noticed both the children and the volunteers doing a lot of smiling.

On April 6, Balentino Rodrigues Reyes, 21, of Sandy, was cited for criminal trespass in the first degree by Sandy police.

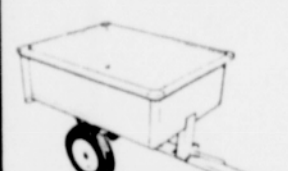

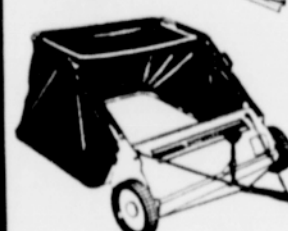
On April 1, William Scott Nix, 24, of Sandy, was cited for violating conditions of an occupational license.

On April 3, Denise Marlene Brooks, 34, of Sandy, was cited for second degree theft of services. She is charged with being hooked up to a cable television service without authorization.

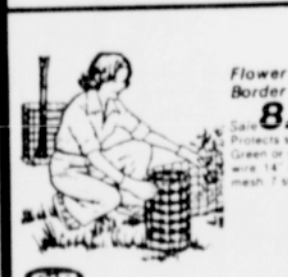
