

City in search of volunteers

As spring approaches, individuals and various groups have approached city officials regarding projects they could undertake to help spruce up the city for the Sandy Mountain Festival. In response to those requests, City Manager Tom Reber has prepared a list of projects in this beautification effort.

They include improvements to the big gazebo in Meinig Park, such as construction and installation of planters, benches and tables.

Benches and posts at City Hall need to be scraped and painted, and a layer of bark dust is needed at City Hall and the Sandy Community Senior Center. Reber said the city

would provide the bark dust. Pruning, weeding and sweeping is needed around City Hall, the Community Senior Center and Meinig Park, Reber said.

For people interested in an indoor project for rainy days, the library could benefit from volunteer labor. Volunteers can "adopt a shelf."

Workers are needed to spend one hour a week "reading" shelves. A specific shelf would be assigned to an individual who would keep that area in alphabetical or numerical order. Training will be provided.

Services for the home-bound also are needed. Volunteers would help organize and deliver library

materials to home-bound patrons. Friends of the Library also could use workers. The group could use help with book sales and other activities designed to promote the library.

Workers are always needed for the Children's Summer Program, helping the library staff with children's crafts and story hour.

Volunteers are needed on an ongoing basis to prepare new library materials, including plastic covers, due dates and other jobs.

Help is also needed to repair books. Additional projects are ongoing and can always use help. They include:

- Volunteers to serve in the police reserves.
 - People to answer the telephones at the Sandy Senior Center.
 - People to help with Meals on Wheels, either as drivers and/or servers.
 - Volunteer coaches for recreation department athletic teams.
 - Drivers for seniors who need assistance in getting rides to the doctor, for shopping and other essential trips.
