MHCC gets real deal on new cars

This fall, automotive technology students at Mt. Hood Community College will have five shiny new Ford Motor Co. vehicles to take apart and put back together.

The college recently received the new 1986 vehicles as a part of a nationwide program sponsored by Ford.

To be selected to participate in the ASSET program is quite an honor in itself, said Michael Durrer, associate dean of the engineering and industrial technology division at the college.

The Automotive Student Service Educational Training program came to the Gresham college in the form of a Lincoln Mark Seven, a Thunderbird, a Tempo, an LTD station wagon and a four-wheel drive pickup.

All told, Ford is donating about \$85,000 in vehicles, parts, hardware and software to the school for the start of the ASSET program in September, Durrer said.

Ford has committed itself to donating between \$80,000 to \$90,000 per year as long as the program lasts, he said.

Durrer said he and his staff are more than pleased with the pro-

gram. "Anytime you can do something like this, it's a real plum," he said.

Fifteen Gresham, Portland and Vancouver, Wash., area automobile dealers are also assisting in the program, Durrer said. Suburban Ford in Sandy is also participating.

The 15 dealers have committed themselves to working with 25 students during the next two years.

Students in the program will spend their two years of training alternating between the school and a dealership. "What they learn at the college, they can apply at the

dealerships," Durrer said.

As for the vehicles, the engines, the transmissions, the rear ends, the carburetors and the other parts Ford donates yearly, Durrer said those eventually will be shipped into the college's other automotive training programs.

MHCC beat out several other automotive programs for the honor of participating in the ASSET program, Durrer said. MHCC was the only community college in Washington, Oregon, Alaska and part of Idaho to be selected into the program.

The center plans to offer its 55 Alive/Mature Driving class, which is the first comprehensive driver retraining course geared to the specific needs of older motorists. The course is taught by older volunteers trained and will be held at the Sandy Senior Center on May 26 and 27 from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

Traffic safety experts and medical authorities agree that almost everyone begins to experience some marked physical changes around age 55 — those changes have an effect on the way we drive. Many older drivers have increasing difficulty with yielding the right-of-way, backing, turning, changing lanes, and entering and leaving freeways.

The course material covers the effects of aging on driving skills. Applying the basic rules of the road, and preventing accidents are among the topics stressed in the course.

Persons 50 years of age or older are eligible to participate in the program and may even qualify to become in-

structors. The course fee is \$7. Preregistration is required. Please contact the Sandy Senior Center at 668-5569 if interested.
