The 18-member band is made up of top musicians from elementary, middle and high schools. If you're interested in playing with the band, try out at one of the practices held Tues-

days at 6 p.m. at Alameda School, 2732 N.E. Fremont, Portland, Oregon.

The band first played together in 1984, opening for the Woody Hite Band. Since then, they've been entertaining audiences and earning standing ovations. They also performed at a Big Band workshop with Lew Tabackin and were the only nonprofessional group to play at Zoo and All That Jazz in the Washington Park Zoo in Oregon.

So, if you are into the Duke's music instead of Prince's style or like the music of Miles Davis better than Madonna, tune into the jazzy style of the Young American Stage Band.

Learn how to walk the dog

"Star Trek" returns again — this time to your living room. In "Star Trek: The Next Generation," a syndicated television series due out this fall, the Klingons will join the crew on Starship Enterprise. The television show premieres on October 3 and 4 with a two-hour movie pilot.

Now you can watch that strange-looking alien "Alf" on Saturday mornings as well as prime time. Alien Productions says the new cartoon will show Alf living on his native planet of Melmac. Watch for it on NBC in the fall.

Pepsi may have Michael, but Michael's dad prefers Jocola. Joe Jackson, father of singer Michael Jackson, has introduced his own cola which he plans to market nationally this summer. Both Pepsi and Jocola face some tough competition from Coke, which has come out with a new face — this one of a mouse. Thirty-four different drawings of Disney characters, including Mickey and Minnie Mouse, will soon show up on cans of Coke, Tab and Sprite. Coke and Disney are teaming up to promote the 15th birthday of Walt Disney World in Florida.

NBC ended the television season as it began — by winning the highest ratings. One rating point represents 874,000 television households. Top show for the year was "The Cosby Show" which earned 34.9 points for the year. But "Family Ties" beat out "Cosby" during the last week of the season, probably because "Cosby" aired a rerun.
