

Schools also receive threats

Bomb threat closes Timberline Lodge

Timberline Lodge was temporarily shut down by a bomb threat May 7. No bomb was found and there was no explosion.

General Manager John O'Neill said the Thursday morning call was made to the the reservation desk on Timberline's WATS line. "The guy said he was a dissatisfied customer who had checked out the day prior. He said he had left a briefcase somewhere with a bomb in it.

"We know it was from out of state because that's the only way that line can be accessed."

Business at the lodge was interrupted for "just a couple of hours," O'Neill said. "We contacted the county sheriff and state police; they were superb. They both sent cars up here immediately."

Timberline followed the instructions of the state bomb disposal team, O'Neill said. The main lodge was evacuated. It was mostly employees at that hour.

O'Neill said most of the day's guests had not checked in, and there were less than a dozen guests on the property at the time.

O'Neill said he doesn't believe

there is any connection between this bomb threat and recent threats that have caused the temporary evacuation of Welches School and Sandy High School.

"We think whoever was doing the Sandy and Welches threats is local, but this guy was definitely from out of state."

Sandy Police Chief Fred Punzel said bomb threats were more of a problem at Sandy High School five years ago. He said they tapped school phones to catch perpetrators.

Punzel said there had been two

bomb threats at Sandy High School this school year.

Punzel said they have a good record of catching people who call in bomb threats, and added that in the past they have identified callers by checking to find out who has been kicked out of school in the past day or two.

Russ Williams, public information officer for the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, said phone-in bomb threats become a problem in the final weeks of school when the weather is nice.

Job tax credits could help employers

The outlook for summer jobs for youth has been improved in 1987 by the return of the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit, said Darrell Dempster of Sandy, who is on the board of directors for the Clackamas County Private Industry Council.

Dempster is an associate broker with Marcus Realty in Sandy.

The PIC oversees the Job Training Partnership job programs for young people.

Employers who hire qualified 16-

and 17-year-olds can receive a tax credit of 85 percent of the first \$3,000 of wages paid during the summer.

At minimum wage, the young person earns \$3.35 per hour. After the TJTC credit, the employer's cost is only 50 cents per hour.

In addition to the tax credit, employers can save a substantial amount of time and money by using the pre-screening services, reported Dempster.

"Our annual summer youth

employment and training program began May 1 and runs through Sept. 30 and we'll be approaching local business to participate in providing job opportunities for 250 young people," he said.

Employment professionals at Employment, Training and Business Services, the PIC's operations arm, assess the young people to assure the best match with the employer's job requirements. Only youth who have demonstrated good job performance skills and are ready to join the local

labor force will be referred to private employers, said Dempster.

The summer program also offers job training opportunities in the public and non-profit sectors for approximately 325 low income youth aged 14 to 21 who can benefit from custom-designed work experiences.

local nurseries that employ immigrant workers so the laborers will not have to miss work to complete the paperwork, she said.

The Hispanic Outreach program works out of offices at St. Henry Catholic Church, 346 N.W. First Ave. in Gresham, and at Good Shepherd Episcopal Church, 38726 S.E. Pioneer Blvd. in Sandy.

But the hours are limited at both locations and the program needs a more permanent home, Lanagan

said. She has asked Mt. Hood Community College to provide two offices, a phone and access to a copy machine, but she has not yet received any promises.

Gleason Eakin, the dean of students, said he would like to find a place on campus where Catholic Family Services could open an office, but he has not found the space.

Mt. Hood Community College is the only other local agency with

authority to accept applications, but so far the college is helping immigrants only in the way of education.

The college offers an English as a second language class in Sandy. The class had 59 students registered as of last week.

Marilyn Becker, who is in charge of personnel at Frank Schmidt and Son nursery in Boring, said the last few days have been the culmination

of months of preparation.

"It's very time consuming. We've been preparing for a long time," she said. "Everybody wants their information today."

Becker said she is helping 200 of the nursery's workers to verify their employment and complete their pre-application forms. The nursery has kept careful and up-to-date records in anticipation of the new law, she said.
