

3 club members win titles

Three members of the Sandy River Hawks track club became state champions June 13 at the state Athletic Congress Track and Field Championship meet in Salem.

Meanwhile, the River Hawks' 400-meter relay team also was crowned a state titlist in the meet.

Stephanie Miljus and Darnell Arthur each became state champs, with honors coming in three events apiece. Miljus competed in the shot put, discus and javelin. Arthur earned medals in the long jump and 400 relay.

Stephanie Clark earned two medals. She earned a first-place

medal with a javelin toss of 71 feet, 10 inches. Clark also finished third in the 400 to earn a medal.

The midget boys 400 relay team of Ben Maddock, Lance Schamberger, Jake Simonis and Arthur narrowly defeated Eugene's track club, with a state championship time of 57.03 seconds.

Bethany Albers, whose goal at the beginning of the track season was to complete one lap of the track without stopping, earned a third-place medal in the 1,500 racewalk. With her third-place showing, Albers earned the opportunity to compete in the Oregon Junior Olympics, which will be held in Hillsboro this weekend.

The midget boys mile relay team of Simonis, Schamberger, John Dixon and Ryan Vollans finished second with a time of 4 minutes, 44.05 seconds. This was the team's best performance, shattering the previous best by 17 seconds.

Dixon also ran a personal record in the midget boys 3,000 with an 11:37.93 clocking. In addition, bantam Keith Hutchinson earned a personal best in the 1,500.

The bantam mile relay team of Aaron O'Meara, Marc Vollans, Scott Schamberger and Hutchinson finished third against some tough competition.

During the course of the six-meet season, 17 River Hawks qualified for the Oregon Junior Olympics.

Recently, Dixon, Ryan Vollans and Simonis competed in the Oregon Junior Olympic Multi-Event meet at Franklin High School in Portland. The threesome competed in the pentathlon, which includes the 50-meter hurdles, long jump, high jump, shot put and the 1,500.

Vollans and Simonis finished third and sixth, respectively, and will represent Oregon at the Regional Junior Olympic meet, which will be held in Spokane, Wash., July 10-12.

Volleyball now all-season sport for high school girls

Volleyball has become a year-round sport for many East Multnomah County girls and several of them already have qualified for the national tournament this summer in Albuquerque, N.M.

It may seem that the State-Metro high school series, which was played Friday night at Gresham High School, would mark the end of a high school player's career. But for girls involved in volleyball clubs, the season peaks in the summer.

The Portland Volleyball Club has five teams, three 17-and-under teams, one 15-and-under squad and one 13-and-under team. Fifty-three girls belong to the club and about 30 of those are from East County, said Carl Neuburger, the University of Portland coach who runs the private club.

The top 17-and-under players form the Portland Black team, which won the winter regional title to qualify for nationals July 4 to 8 in New Mexico.

Seven of the 10 members of the Black team are from East County — Julie Leamon, Christine Camp and Debbie Bennett of Gresham High School, Chris Bond and Tricia Becker of Corbett High School, and Carrie Couturier and Stephanie Rohrbough of Barlow High School. Two of the other players are from St. Mary's High School and the other girl is from Vancouver, Wash.

Gresham won the Class AAA state high school title last fall while Barlow was the runner-up. Corbett captured the Class A state championship.

Combining those players makes a powerful squad, which is one reason Neuburger believes the team can finish in the top 16 at the national tournament.

"If we finish between ninth and 16th, I'll be real happy," said Neuburger, whose wife Terry Neuburger coaches the Barlow High School team. "We possibly could be in the top eight, but that'll be real tough. I would be disappointed if we finish out of the top 16."

The success of the three East County high school teams last fall didn't really surprise Neuburger.

"These players were good before they were recognized in high school," he said. "Most of them have been playing year-round for two-to-three years."

"The fact that Gresham, Barlow, Marshall and St. Mary's were in the top five teams isn't a hit and miss thing," said Neuburger. "Most of the key players on those teams play year-round volleyball

and they take that experience to their high school teams."

The Portland Volleyball Club began in 1976 for current and former college players. An under 18 program began in 1980 and the club no longer offers teams for players over age 18.

Monthly member dues and fund-raisers make the club self-supporting, said Neuburger, whose part-time job as coach at UP also enables him to run the club. The club rents the Portland State University gym for practices a couple of nights a week during its winter season from January to May.

Each winter season begins in December with a trip to the Long Beach, Calif., tournament. The Portland Black team grabbed fifth place last year out of 72 teams.

Tournaments are on weekends from January to May. That enabled players such as Becker and Bond to play basketball for Corbett along with winter volleyball.

Neuburger said the experience gained in playing club volleyball greatly helps the players in high school competition.

"The winter competition is much more demanding in skills and high-powered volleyball," he said. "Most of the teams have the top players from several schools. And we play several college women's teams."

The five Portland Volleyball Club teams and a 15-and-under team from Gresham will attend a volleyball festival for teams from the western United States June 29 to July 2 in Davis, Calif.

About 275 teams are expected at the tournament, including about 104 in the 17-and-under group. Neuburger said he expects the Black team to be seeded anywhere from third to sixth.

But no matter what Portland Black does in the Davis festival, it has already qualified for nationals because it captured the regional title for Oregon and southwest Washington teams.

The top team from the Portland club has finished in the top 16 in the nation every year since 1982, said Neuburger. The highest finish was third place three years ago.

Former members of the Portland club include Barlow graduates Linda Johnson, Carol Sears and Monica Camp. Johnson went on to earn All-America honors at Portland State University and last spring was named the new head volleyball coach at Mt. Hood Community College.

Barlow High coach resigns his position

Seeking a break from the demands of coaching, Bill Suter has resigned after six seasons as the Barlow High School girls basketball coach.

Suter will be replaced by Kerry Clawson, 31, a former University of Oregon women's basketball player. Clawson is working this summer as a recreational leader for the parks department in Salt Lake City, Utah. She was unable to be reached for comment.

Clawson doesn't have any head coaching experience, but has played semipro basketball and coached at camps and clinics, including a tour through South America, said Jim Wolf, athletic director for the Gresham School District.

"We're happy to have her and it appears she will be a tremendous role model for the girls," said Wolf.

Clawson, who played at Oregon from 1977-79, will be a special education teacher at Barlow. She was living in Montana last spring and applied for a job with the Gresham School District, which sought applicants in Montana.

Suter, 43, said the time commitment required during the season and in the off-season running the summer program became too overbearing for him.

"The season is long," he said. "And I've been in organized basketball for 25 years as a player and coach. It's time to let somebody younger get after it."

Suter had several winning seasons and state playoff appearances at Barlow, the last one in 1986. His 1986-87 team tied for last in the Mount Hood Conference with a 4-12 record.

"I wanted to take a winter off and see what it's like to have a Christmas," said Suter. "I want to spend more time with my family."

He has a son, who will be a junior in college, and a daughter, who will be a sophomore at Putnam High School in Milwaukie, where the Suter family lives. Suter will continue to teach math at Barlow.

The past few years Suter has struggled to get members of the fall volleyball team to play basketball in the winter. Several of those athletes decided to play only winter club volleyball and not join the Bruin basketball team.

Zig Zag resident to run in Western States race

Zig Zag resident Winterhawk Semler will compete in the Western States Endurance Run Saturday.

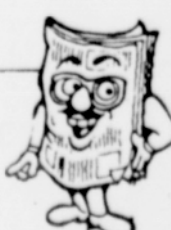
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
