Project awaits Sandy volunteers

The city of Sandy has received numerous complaints about stop signs that have peeling paint on them.

City Manager Tom Reber said he has received permission from the state Highway Division to scrape the posts. But he is not sure if the public works crew will be able to get the project completed before the Mountain Festival.

Reber said if members of a volunteer group wished to scrape the posts, they should call him by Friday, July 3, at 668-5533.

Reber said the city of Sandy does not paint its sign posts. The state's posts have been soaked in creosote and painted over.

About 15 of the state's stop signs are along Pioneer and Proctor boulevards.

Disabled camper sites available

The Mount Hood National Forest has released a brochure listing campground and other facilities available for the physically disabled.

The Forest Service has been improving recreation facilities to provide access for the physically disabled for some time. But use has not increased in proportion. The brochure is intended to increase the awareness of the handicapped community to these opportunities so they may more readily enjoy their national forest.

About 40 campgrounds and picnic areas have toilet facilities modified for use by wheelchair users in the Mount Hood National Forest. Some of these campgrounds have tables and other facilities adapted for wheelchair campers.

In some areas, specially designed fishing platforms and trails have been developed. These campgrounds and picnic areas are spread through the Forest and lend themselves to use for day trips as well as overnight camping.

The brochures are available at all Mount Hood National Forest offices. Those wishing a copy by mail should contact the Bear Springs Ranger Station, Route 1, Maupin, 97037, or phone 328-6211. There is no charge for the brochure.

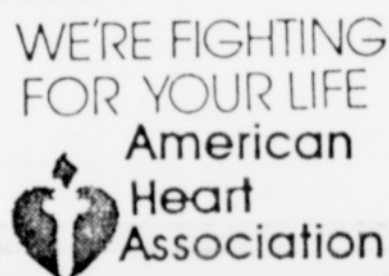

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New trial date will be scheduled

OREGON CITY — A new trial date for the man charged in connection with the murder of a Boring woman will be scheduled in Clackamas County Circuit Court.

On Monday, Circuit Court Judge Howard J. Blanding declared a mistrial in the felony murder trial of Thomas J. Tucciarone.

Tucciarone is charged in connection with the death of 32-year-old Deborah Jean Duree. Duree was shot

in the head at her home at 31040 S.E. Church Road, on Oct. 16, 1986, and died five days later.

Blanding declared the mistrial after jurors could not reach a decision based on evidence presented at the trial.

A new trial date will be set, said Bob Ryan, the county district attorney's chief investigator in the case.

On April 29, David Lee Mann of Portland was convicted by a jury on the same felony murder charge, first-degree burglary and two counts of first-degree robbery. Mann was sentenced later to life imprisonment.

Although the mistrial was declared, the jury found Tucciarone guilty of first-degree robbery and first-degree burglary in connection with the shooting incident.



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
