Youth theater sets signups

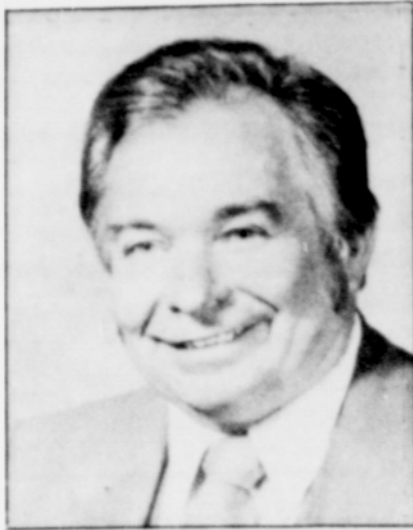
Final registration for the Sandy Summer Youth Theater will begin at 1 p.m. Thursday, July 16, at Meinig Park.

projects this fall and winter, the planning commission makes land use and zoning decisions that affect people in residential, commercial and industrial areas.

While a person who works as a planner might know good planning principles, members of a planning commission know their community and can help apply those principles in a way that meets the community's needs, Faulkner said.

"It's an exciting position for someone who wants to help the city take shape," she said.

The planning commission meets the first Wednesday of each month at City Hall. Applicants must live either within the city of Sandy or within its urban growth boundary.

People with questions may contact Faulkner. Applications may be pick-

ed up at City Hall.

Faulkner said new planning commissioners will receive training before they begin their terms.

"They have to be willing to make a commitment," Faulkner said. "It's going to take some time."

Current planning commissioners are Kimberly Nelson, chairwoman, Marian James, Kathy Abbott, Buzz Ruch and Mike Platz. Advisors are Elvira Muff, Phil Jonsrud and Mark Mullins.

The positions now open formerly were held by Steve Dirks, who has moved outside the urban growth boundary, and David Mills Jr., who had other demands on his time.

Members of the planning commission are especially interested in having representatives from the business community apply for the positions, Faulkner said.

Faulkner, who will work as city planner until September, is a senior associate for Cogan, Sharpe and Cogan, a Portland consulting firm.

She has 12 years of experience as a planner, including work at the cities of Milwaukie and Lake Oswego.

She also has experience working on the side of private industry.

"I have a real appreciation of the frustration level (that accompanies applying for permits)," she said.

Faulkner, who has a master's degree from Portland State University, will head up a project for Cogan, Sharpe and Cogan putting together a handbook offering advice on streamlining the permit process.

The handbook is being financed through a grant from the state Department of Land Conservation and Development.

Forest Service installs signs

Getting around on Forest Service roads is different from driving on a city street or state highway. "Some Forest Service roads are not maintained for passenger car use," said Jeff Jaqua, Mount Hood National Forest traffic engineer.

"So the Forest Service came up with a new way of identifying roads."

The new route markers are being installed this summer on all roads not suited for passenger car use in the region. New signs will be installed nationwide in the next few years.

The new signs will feature numbers in a vertical format, a change from the standard horizontal form. By using vertical numbers on route signs, the Forest Service hopes to indicate to the public that some roads are forest roads and are not maintained as well as city, county or state roads.
