Trip planned into Bull Run

The U.S. Forest Service will conduct a field trip into the Bull Run Watershed on Saturday, Aug. 1, to view and discuss proposals for trees damaged in a 1983 windstorm.

A Draft Environmental Impact Statement listing eight alternatives for nearly 6,000 acres of blowdown will be discussed. Options range from leaving all of the trees in place to salvaging and reforesting 2,392 acres.

The field trip will give the public an opportunity to see first-hand a number of wind-damaged areas, and

discuss options with specialists who were involved in developing the Draft Environmental Impact Statement. The trip leaders include a forest service forester and a citizen environmental activist.

The group will leave Gresham at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 1, and will return by 4 p.m. Admission is free.

People attending should wear boots or sturdy shoes, outdoor clothing and take a sack lunch and rain jacket.

Larry Lee Buchanan, a supervisor for Lewis Packing Co., died in an automobile accident in Sandy on July 17. He was 19.

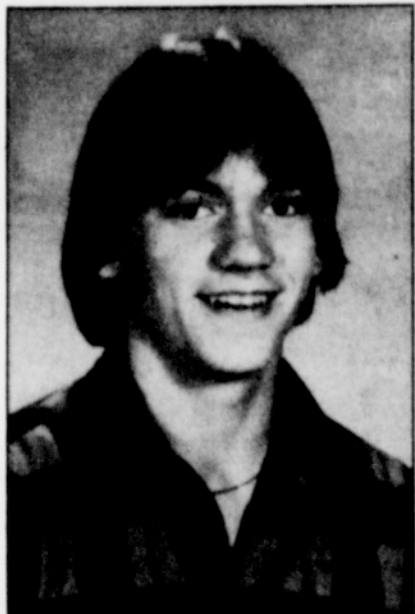
Funeral services were July 21 in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Burial followed at Cliffside Cemetery in Sandy.
