Public opinion sought

Hearing to address ordinance change

Sandy residents wishing to address a pending ordinance change allowing conditional industrial uses downtown have until Tuesday, Aug. 11, to ask in writing that they be heard.

Those submitting written requests to the city by the deadline will be permitted to speak before the City Council hears the second and final reading of the ordinance change on Aug. 17.

The six council members present Monday unanimously passed the first reading of the ordinance that could open downtown Sandy to light industrial development. The first reading was tabled July 20.

The unanimous vote came despite reservations by some councilors that businesses meeting the new condi-

tions may be unsuited for the core area.

The amended code would allow conditional uses by light manufacturers: laboratories or offices for research, development, testing and experimentation; and warehousing or distribution facilities.

The council agreed to accept more public comment after downtown land owner Dale Nicholls complained that there was insufficient notice about the plans to change the ordinance. He named a few property holders, including Lou Zimnel, owner of the Sandy Marketplace and the old Thriftway store building, who were unaware of the situation. The council already has held a public hearing on

the issue.

Under the broadened zoning, Councilor Jim Duff said, a public storage facility could try to locate here, although "Aesthetically, it doesn't belong in the downtown area." Although the city planning commission could impose conditions for use

of the downtown land, Duff says he fears that the city's design review powers would be limited.

Councilors Larry Buck and Mort Spence disagreed, saying that conditional uses give the city enough power to mold downtown the way it wishes.

Oregon Chautauqua focuses on Northwest immigrant life

"Cultural Encounters" is the 1987 theme for the seventh annual Oregon Chautauqua, which opens at 8 p.m. Friday, Aug. 14, in the Sandy Union High School gymnasium.

The performance and lecture series is patterned after the tent Chautauqs that toured the backroads of America at the turn of the century. It features a mixed-media theatrical presentation, "Teatro Nuestro."

The drama is about members of a family of Spanish-speaking immigrant workers in the Northwest who must interpret their experience through the economic and cultural conditions of immigrant life. As drama portrays how the Sanchez family must constantly face the question of what it means to be in this land, both physically and culturally.

Spanish and English are both spoken during the performance. The singing group "Sandunga" provides a host of songs and musical interludes.

Like its predecessors, Oregon Chautauqua offers presentations that blend music, theater, puppetry and lecture. Each year, the program

focuses on a different theme. The Oregon Committee for the Humanities is sponsoring the Oregon Chautauqua along with Catholic Family Services, Oregon Legal Services and Clackamas County Migrant Education.

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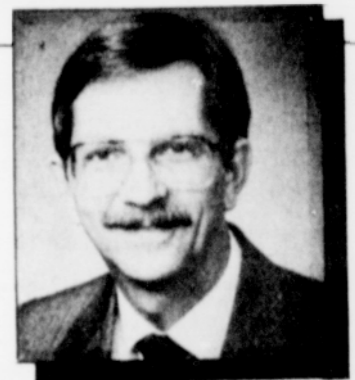
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
