LeRoy Nelson

LeRoy Robert "Bob" Nelson, 58, of Sandy, died Aug. 19 in an automobile accident near Canby.

Nelson was known for his work as a master gardener and master food preserver for the Clackamas County extension service.

He was born Sept. 12, 1928, in South Dakota. He served in the Army during World War II, and was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 4273 in Sandy.

He moved to Oregon in 1946 and worked for 30 years selling items at flea markets.

He was married May 27, 1985, to his wife, Violet, at the home of his parents in Grandview, Wash. His parents were celebrating their 60th anniversary.

Services were held Aug. 24 at Everhart and Kent Funeral Home in Canby. Burial was at Willamette National Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Violet; two daughters: Diane DeSerano of Yacolt, Wash., and Vicki Goughnour of Vancouver, Wash.; seven stepchildren: Joyce Laski of Portland, Sandy Graham of Belleville, Mich., Tim Hallock of Vestaburg, Mich., Minnie Hixon of Ionia, Mich., Rosella Mancillas and Margie Willcutt, both

Henry Schwartz

Henry Schwartz, a Sandy resident for over 80 years, died in a local care center on Aug. 22. He was 84.

Henry Lewis Schwartz was born in Perham, Minn., on May 14, 1903. When he was 3, his family came to Oregon to settle in the Sandy area where he later received his education at the Immanuel Lutheran Church Parochial School.

When Henry was 14, he got his first real job, cutting cord wood for 10 hours a day. He was proficient at sharpening tools of all types. He worked in the woods and in sawmills for many years.

In 1946 he began working for Portland General Electric Co., retiring in 1968.

On May 26, 1934, Henry was married to Marie Baumbach. Making their permanent home in Sandy where they raised their family, they were both active members of Immanuel Lutheran Church as well as

other community and civic organizations.

In 1983, Henry and Marie were crowned king and queen at the summer picnic of the Sandy Pioneer and Historical Association.

He is survived by his wife, Marie; three sons: Edward of Powell Butte, Ore., and Earnest and Lyle, both of Sandy; his brother: Ted Schwartz of Yahatz; four sisters: Helen Suckow of Gresham, Ella Joost of Gresham, Anna Deacon of Portland and Gertrude Haas of Hillsboro; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Aug. 26 at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Sandy. Interment followed at Firhill Memorial Cemetery in Sandy.

Josephine Shields, a former Sandy resident, died Aug. 24 at a Molalla care center at the age of 59.

Funeral Mass for Mrs. Shields was held Aug. 26 at St. Michael's Catholic

She was born Josephine Geraldine Hartney in Shumitt, Mont., on April 2, 1928. She grew up and received her education in New York.

They lived in Spokane where they began their family. In 1967 they moved to Gresham, moving back to Yakima in 1972.

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\$650,000 a year that other taxpayers would not have to pay, said Wally Douthwaite, city manager.

The city will benefit further as the Fujitsu project attracts other companies to the Gresham area and support businesses or suppliers build here in order to be close to the microelectronics giant, Tryon said.

Some businesses have already shown an interest in the area near the Fujitsu site, and the city expects much more, Douthwaite said.

"I wouldn't be surprised if we start to see a flurry of smaller developers putting in permit applications in that area," he said.

Burrows said the two largest construction projects in the Portland metropolitan area will be under construction in Gresham at the same time — Fujitsu and the Albertson's distribution center to be located in the Banfield Corporate Park.

"Certainly, that will attract a lot more attention from industries," he said. "People will realize what a great place we have here."

Burrow said he is not concerned that Fujitsu has only committed to building one phase so far.

"The dynamics of the industry are such that the future is an unknown quantity. The future is beyond the

control of everyone. I'm happy the investment is being made."

The city has calculated and anticipated the construction of the Fujitsu project in planning for the expansion of its sewer plant. The city will be able to handle the additional one million gallons of sewage Fujitsu is expected to generate, Douthwaite

said. Once the expansion is completed, in early 1989, the sewer plant will be able to handle all seven phases that Fujitsu has said it will build.

Fujitsu has contributed \$3.2 million to the \$15.7 million sewer plant expansion.



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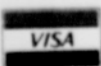
