Service keeps couple on go

Howard Berger has incredible timing.

He took a job at the Bank of California in Portland just four weeks before the stock market crash of 1929.

He remembers that fateful day well. For one thing he was busy, running between stock brokers' offices and the bank — at one time with a quarter of a million dollars' worth of negotiable bonds under his jacket.

Berger was 19 at the time. Despite the severity of the depression, he managed to remain employed in the banking industry.

Berger retired in 1975 after 17 years as executive vice president and chief executive officer at the Clackamas County Bank. He served on the board of directors until 1980.

In 1981, he was honored by the Oregon Bankers Association for 50 years of service to the industry.

Retirement hasn't slowed the pace of his life, however. Berger is treasurer for Mount Hood Hospice, a care organization for people with terminal illnesses.

He is chairman of the advisory committee at the Sandy Senior Center. The board makes recommendations on the activities to be offered by the senior center.

And, in January, Berger will be honored for his 40 years of service to the Kiwanis Club.

He also is serving on a citizens task force studying issues for the Sandy City Council. The task force is weighing the benefits of a community center against other community needs.

Berger's wife of 41 years, Sara, is equally active. She is involved in the Business and Professional Women's Club and works as a substitute teacher in Sandy, Estacada and Boring.

Sara said she enjoys teaching. "I like to be with young people," she said.

The Bergers host a party for foreign exchange students at their home each year. Their house, which offers a view of the bend in the Sandy River, is at what was once the site of the early "pioneer picnics."

Of all the activities the Bergers have been involved in, they seem to take special pride in the development of the Sandy Industrial Park.

A group of investors pooled their money to develop the park on a piece of timberland with only modest value.

The property had a narrow road

on it that was shaded by the tall trees, making it a "lover's lane," Sara said.

As they sold property, the money was plowed back into the park. Berger is proud of the contribution they made to the economic health of Sandy.

"All those businesses add to the payroll and add to the tax rolls," he said.

The goal was to bring jobs to Sandy, not to turn a profit. "We told them (the investors) we might not make a dime," Berger said.

But, when the corporation was dissolved, investors received a return of about three times on their original investment.

Berger had the same kind of success at the Clackamas County Bank. When he started, the bank had deposits of \$4 million, an amount that quadrupled by the time he retired.

Berger — former president of the Oregon Independent Bankers Association and the Sandy Area

Chamber of Commerce's 1971 Citizen of the Year — is still called upon to get results. But, as his involvement at the senior center shows, he's not complaining.

Although the senior center receives funds from the city and the federal government, its members

also raise money and volunteer time to keep programs going.

"It's not something someone else dished out for us," Berger said. "It's something we're doing for ourselves."

The Bergers have two children and a granddaughter.

Sara had to walk to dance

Howard Berger attended Sandy High School for three years before his parents moved to Portland where he graduated from Franklin High School. Sara Sewell grew up in Murry Cross, a rural crossroads in Alabama.

Berger was stationed at Camp Sibert near Gadsden, Ala., during World War II. He saw Sara at a softball game between the officers and the enlisted men.

"I was pitching for the enlisted men; she had a date with an officer," he joked.

Later, they began dating. After

they got married, Sara moved to Oregon as Howard returned to his job at the Bank of California in Portland.

Sara said she didn't mind the move, saying it seemed like an adventure and she liked to travel.

Although Sara doesn't have a Southern accent, Howard said he had to get used to her Southern expressions.

One of them involved the use of the word "carry" for "take."

When people asked Berger if he "carried Sara to the dance," he would reply, "No. I made her walk."

At 6 p.m., one hour before these forums are scheduled, Clackamas County Social Services would like to meet participants from the Sandy

community to discuss issues regarding the upcoming White House Conference on Aging, scheduled for 1991. Previous White House Conferences have led to the enactment of important legislation benefiting seniors.

The annual flu clinic will be held at the center on Wednesday, Oct. 14, from 1 to 3 p.m. Many doctors and health officials recommend immunization against influenza for people over the age of 65. This year's flu shot contains the strains A/Taiwan; A/Leningrad/360/86; and B/Ann Arbor 1/86. The cost of the clinic this year remains at \$3 and is sponsored by Sandy Union High School. People with questions about the appropriateness of taking the immunization should consult their doctor. Pre-registration is advisable and can be completed by calling the center at 668-5569.
