Edna Goheen

Edna Goheen, a longtime Sandy area resident, died in a Gresham care center on Oct. 6. She was 89.

Mrs. Goheen was born Edna Faye Dodd in Lehigh, Iowa, on March 25, 1889, to Elkanah "Albert" and Elizabeth A. Dodd.

Prior to moving to Oregon in 1910, her family lived in Kansas and North Dakota.

Edna worked with her family harvesting and packing seasonal crops such as vegetables, berries, fruits and nuts. After graduating from the grade school in Boring, she worked as a nurse maid.

On Oct. 22, 1921, she was married to William Leonard Goheen. They made their home in Sandy, where they began their family.

After her husband's death in 1926, Mrs. Goheen remained in Sandy, where she raised their three children, Jack, Robert and Jean. Besides working as a homemaker, she worked, and retired as, a licensed tester for a local creamery.

She enjoyed traveling in the United States and Canada, visiting national parks, monuments and historical sites. Besides her hobbies of doll making, sewing, flower gardening

and walking, she liked making breads, pies and cakes for her family and friends.

She was proud that her Dodd lineage could be traced to the arrival of Daniel Dodd, an English Puritan, at Bradford, Conn., in the year 1646.

She is survived by two children: Jack L. Goheen of Sandy and Jean L. Moore of Boring; a brother: Bill Dodd of Oregon City; two sisters: Doris MacDonald of Portland and Pat Bacon of Pendleton; four grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Visitation was held Friday in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Graveside services were Oct. 10 at Firhill Memorial Cemetery.

Roy Stamm

Royce "Roy" Francis Stamm, a retired lumber mill worker, died at Mount Hood Medical Center on Oct. 9. He was 78.

Mr. Stamm was born in Sandpoint, Idaho, on Dec. 20, 1908. He was raised in Sandpoint, where he received his education. In the early 1930s he moved to Oregon, where he worked in construction on the southern coast.

In 1935, he was married. Roy and

his wife, Patience, came to the Sandy area in 1957. Roy worked in local lumber mills. Shortly after his wife's death in 1965, Roy retired but remained in the Sandy area.

He is survived by his sister, June Grove of St. Mary's, Idaho.

At the request of Mr. Stamm, no services were held. Sandy Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Phillip Kanzelman

Phillip Lee Kanzelman, a millwright for Vanport Manufacturing Inc., died of cancer at his home near Sandy on Oct. 10. He was 48.

He was born in Bismark, N.D., on April 11, 1939. After growing up and completing his education in South Dakota, Phil soon became self-employed in the trucking industry.

In 1967, he sold his trucking business and moved to California. After living in California for a short time, he moved to Oregon and made his home near Sandy. On Oct. 12, 1984, he was married to Alice Markwell in Vancouver, Wash.

Phil was employed in the lumber industry after coming to Oregon. He then worked for the Union Pacific

Railroad Co. for eight years prior to going to work for Vanport as a millwright. He was forced to stop work in July of this year due to illness.

He enjoyed working on their home, where he enjoyed a picturesque view of Mount Hood. He was a member of the Sandy Lions Club for 10 years and a former member of the Lutheran church.

He is survived by his wife, Alice; children: Kelly Sweeney in California, Cindy Beer in Tennessee, Kevin Kanzelman of Sandy, and Blaine Kanzelman, also in California; his mother and stepfather: Myrtle and Irwin Westby of North Dakota; a sister, Phyllis Meier of South Dakota; a brother: Darwyn Kanzelman of North Dakota; two grandchildren, four step-children and three step-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his father, Wilrich Kanzelman, and a brother, Erlin Kanzelman.

Funeral services were held Oct. 14 in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Vault interment followed at the Sandy Ridge Cemetery.

Penalties levied against builders

Civil penalties have been levied against three area builders for violations of the Oregon homebuilders law.

The law requires residential construction firms, including self-employed individuals and partners, to register with the State Builders Board before they advertise, bid on, or engage in, home construction or repair work.

Those fined were:

- Terry Emanuel Boyer of Eagle Creek. He received a \$1,000 fine for roofing a residence while not registered with the Builders Board.

- Michael Ray South of Eastside Concrete, Boring. He received a \$1,000 fine for installing a foundation for a residence while not registered

with the Builders Board.

- Judith R. Anderson of Quality Concrete, Sandy. She received a \$600 fine for bidding to do concrete work for a residence while not registered with the Builders Board.

A shortage of snow on California mountains probably caused many skiers to head north last season.

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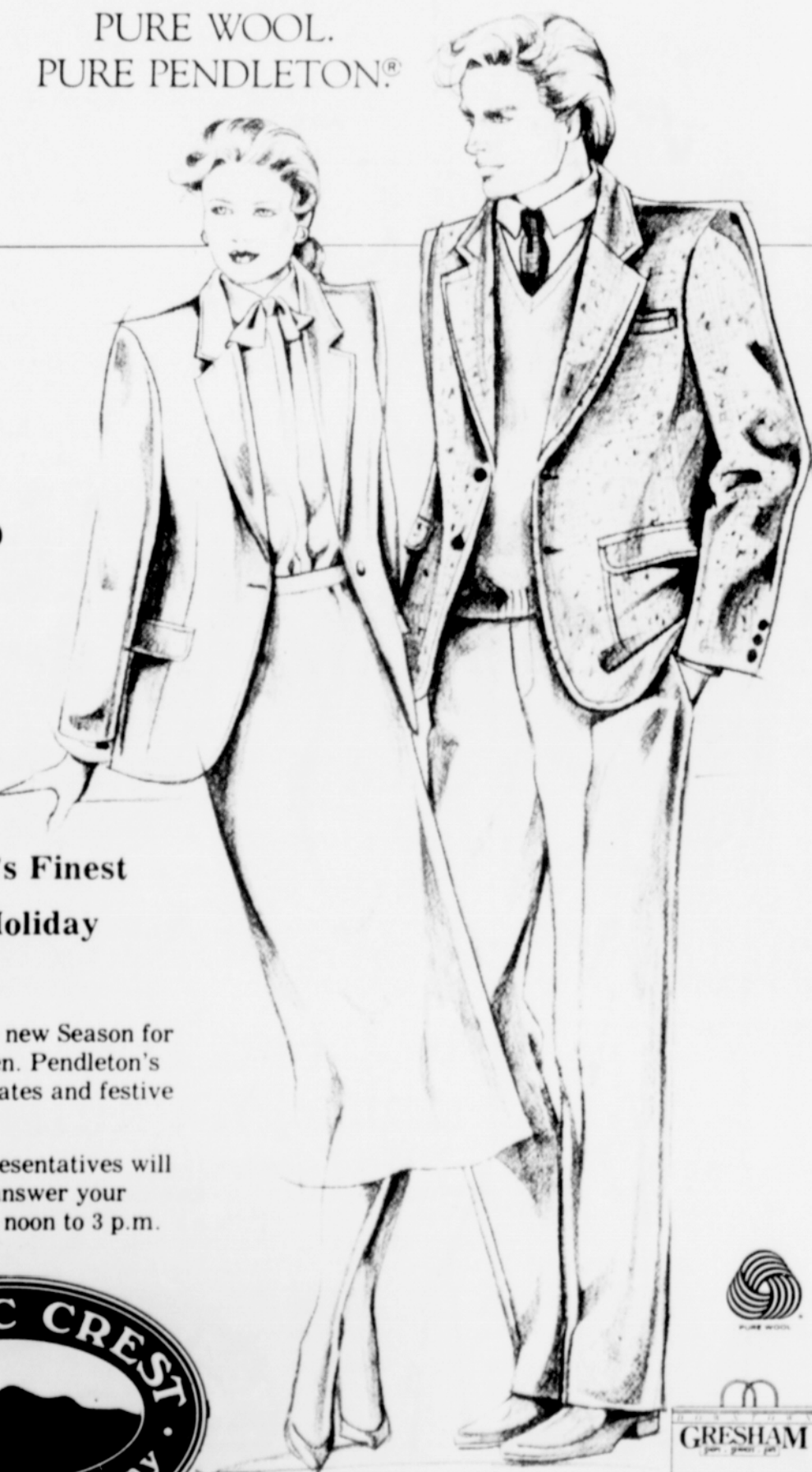
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
