George Heil

George E. "Buzz" Heil, 38, a former Boring resident, died of cancer Oct. 22 in Gresham at the home of his wife's parents, William and Colleen Skibba.

Mr. Heil, former owner of Heil Automotive in Boring, had been living in Arizona because of his health.

He was born in Bayard, Neb., on July 27, 1949, to George E. and Mary E. Heil. In 1955 his family moved to Idaho. In 1963 they moved to Ontario and he graduated from high school in

1967. Following graduation he worked for the U.S. Forest Service in Oregon and California.

He was employed as a logger for a time and then turned to truck driving and auto mechanics.

Mr. Heil moved to this area in 1976 and opened an automotive shop on Highway 212 the following year. He sold the business in 1980 and returned to truck driving. He worked for Schroder Trucking until his health prevented him from driving. He and his wife, Cheryl, moved to Arizona in 1985.

His hobbies were beachcombing,

agate collecting and working on cars. He built a jeep, which he named "Plum Crazy," for the mud-o-ramas.

Survivors are his wife, Cheryl of Gresham, and children: Michael, Dawn and Steven Slippy, LaGrande; Carrie Heil, Hemet, Calif.; and Troy Struttman, Gresham. Other survivors are his mother, Mary Weaser, Wickenburg, Ariz.; a brother, Charles J. Heil, Clackamas; and sister, Betsy, of San Francisco, Calif.

The funeral was Monday at Carroll Funeral Home. The remains were cremated.
