Ski season to open this week on Hood

Mount Hood Meadows will open for snow skiing Thursday, while two other ski resorts were waiting for more snow before announcing definite opening dates.

Timberline Lodge and Ski Bowl Multitorpor tentatively plan to open this weekend, employees say.

Starting Thursday, Nov. 26, Mount Hood Meadows will operate three chair lifts from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Red, Buttercup and Daisy lifts will run those hours Friday through Sunday as well.

Mount Hood Meadows had 18 inches of snow at the base and up to 24 inches on top as of Tuesday morning. Heavy snow was falling at the time.

More of the area's other five lifts will open as the snow cover thickens.

Timberline Lodge needed another foot of snow before it would open this weekend, area operator Dick Kohnstamm said Tuesday. He decided on a definite opening date after the Post went to press.

There were 24 inches of snow at the

lodge early Nov. 24, Kohnstamm said. "We need the 36 (inches) really," he said.

He urged skiers to check with the lodge. "It can snow an inch an hour here," he said, "and it has (before)."

If the needed snow falls, the lodge would operate from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. this Friday through Sunday, Kohnstamm said.

Light snowfall was reported there Tuesday by Kohnstamm.

Ski Bowl Multitorpor, the area nearest Portland, tentatively plans to open for business Saturday, Nov. 28, for the first time in two years, according to Kirk Hanna, its new owner.

Multitorpor, formerly known as Mirror Mountain, needed a couple more feet of snow to be ready for skiing, an employee said.

Weather forecasts reported by ski area employees were conflicting, with Mount Hood Meadows expecting snowfall through the weekend and Timberline Lodge anticipating snowfall Tuesday and Wednesday.

School board appoints three to budget panel

The Sandy Elementary School District's budget committee gained two members and an alternate member through board action Nov. 19.

The board unanimously appointed Raymond Kelsay and Kylie Milne to three-year terms. Linda Smyth is alternate.

The new members replace Sherylle Emerson and Gerald Hale.

The board's vote came after nearly an hour of interviews with the three applicants in executive, or closed-door, session.

The 10-member budget committee will begin studying the 1988-89 budget early next year, said Sandy Elementary School District Superintendent

Lee Chapman.

All three of the new committee members are parents of school-age children.

Kelsay is a city of Gresham police officer with 13 years of law enforcement experience. He worked five years for the Oregon State Police.

Milne has worked as customer service representative at the Sandy branch of Clackamas County Bank for the past four years. She has been in banking for 10 years and has served as treasurer of Riverside Water District.

Smyth works as a certified public accountant in what she calls a small Portland accounting firm.

James Hereford

James L. Hereford, a World War I veteran and a recent Boring resident, died Nov. 22 in Gresham at the age of 90.

Mr. Hereford was born Dec. 25, 1896, in Cumberland, Md., where he was raised and educated. He joined the U.S. Army during World War I.

After his discharge, Hereford worked for the Hannah Mining Co. in Ohio. He helped with shipping on the Great Lakes, later becoming a captain.

He met and married Helen M. Drust in Ohio. They spent winters in Florida, where they moved after his retirement from Hannah Mining Co. in 1963.

His wife preceded him in death. He then spent his summers with his daughter in Boring and, in 1985, moved there permanently.

He enjoyed fishing and playing cards.

Survivors include his daughter, Phyllis Luedtke King, Boring; one grandchild and three great-grandchildren.

Service and burial will be at Naples Memorial Gardens in Naples, Fla.

Horton Bacon

A graveside service for Horton

Perry Bacon, formerly of Sandy, was Nov. 24 at Cliffs Cemetery.

Bacon died Nov. 21 in a Gresham care center. He was 74.

He was born on March 5, 1913 in Pleasant Home, where his mother came from the family's Opal City homestead for medical care.

The Bacons lived in Opal City until 1920. They then moved to the Sandy area where Horton Bacon graduated from high school.

He worked at a variety of jobs until 1940, when he was employed as a trolley car mechanic for the Portland Traction Co. He retired from what became Tri-Met in 1977.

Mr. Bacon moved to Portland in 1937 but returned to Boring in 1951. He made Portland his permanent home in 1965.

He married Alice Dickson on Sept. 22, 1979.

Bacon enjoyed hunting, fishing and other outdoors activities.

He is survived by his wife, Alice Bacon, Portland; his children, Dan Bacon, Eagle Creek, Jay Bacon and Sam Bacon, both of Boring, Rhonda Owen, Portland, and Bethalee Nichol, Beaverton; two stepchildren, John Dickson, Hillsboro, and Bill Dickson, Eugene; a brother, Gordon Bacon, Portland; 11 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Robert Epperson

Former Sandy High School custodian Robert Epperson died Nov. 18 in a Portland hospital. He was 81.

Mr. Epperson was born April 2, 1906 in Centerville, Iowa. He attended school in Missouri.
