

Fire causes \$10,000 in damages

A volunteer firefighter spotted smoke coming out a door about noon on Nov. 30 and his quick action may have kept the fire from being more serious, according to Gary Connelly, fire chief.

Connelly said Steve Wilson was working in the area when he drove by the house at 4464 Kleinsmith Road. Wilson, a volunteer firefighter, called in the alarm and then went to the Dover station to get a fire truck. Wilson and another volunteer were on the scene within four minutes, Connelly said.

The house is located about a mile from the Dover fire station.

Damage from the chimney fire was estimated at \$10,000. The wall next to the chimney was damaged and the house received extensive smoke damage, he said.

No one was home at the time of the fire. It is owned by Steve Olson.

Connelly said a creosote buildup in the chimney overheated and "conducted out" to the wood walls.

review issues already identified by the district staff and to submit additional ones on response forms provided. Comments should be mailed by Dec. 18 to the Zigzag Ranger District, Mount Hood National Forest, Zigzag 97049.

Plans call for logging 8.8 million board feet of timber and building a half-mile-long road in the Snowshoe Planning Area near Government Camp.

The Olive Planning Area north of Alder Creek would have three million board feet of timber harvested and seven-tenths of a mile of road built.

Plans are tentative for activities in the Middle Eagle Creek area west of the Salmon-Huckleberry Wilderness, Lamb said. The district expects to log beetle-infested trees there and to decide how the rock quarry near the Douglas Trail should be managed.

Longtime U.S. Forest Service critic Michael P. Jones of Rhododendron was unprepared yet to comment at length on any of the three plans. Jones and his group, Friends of Enola Hill, are preoccupied with a planned private timber sale near Government Camp, he said, as well as the proposed Enola Hill sale on forest service land.

He called the Snowshoe Area "potentially sensitive". About 200 of the area's 2,200 acres are targeted for logging, Lamb said.

Jones also accused the Forest Service of locating timber sales in the Middle Eagle Creek area to prevent future expansion of the wilderness area next door.

One question being asked by the district concerns the idea of opening vistas in the Middle Eagle Creek area for sightseeing into the Salmon-Huckleberry Wilderness.

The Middle Eagle Creek plan will analyze projects planned there over the next decade, Lamb says.

About 140 of the Olive area's approximately 1,300 acres would be thinned and clear cut, Lamb said. Another 15 acres would be tested as a potential site for growing seedlings begun from specially-selected pine cone seed.

Issues involving the Snowshoe Area, according to the district, may include visual quality from U.S. Highway 26 and Timberline Road, effects on meadows, wetlands, elk calving areas and cross-country skiing, water quality of Still Creek and the West Fork of the Salmon River, and the Salmon River's potential designation as a Scenic River.

Logging the Olive Area could affect the view from U.S. Highway 26, water quality of the Little Sandy River, diversity of wildlife habitat in key big game winter range, adjacent private land, and other timber sales nearby, said forest service staff.

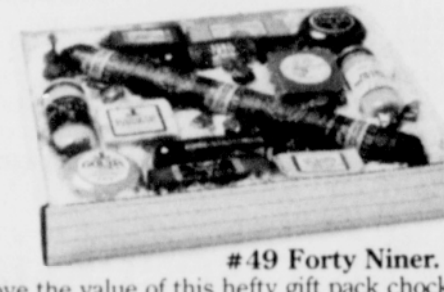

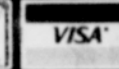

from the north side, has not been harmed as much as the view from the south side of the river.

People living on Oral Hull and Tapp roads look up at a clear-cut, York said.

Landrey said PGE, which has contracted with logging companies to do the cutting, is not the only company logging in the area northeast of Sandy.

"Marmot Road is busy with timber trucks, and they are not all from PGE," he said. "Part of the Sandy economy is based on the timber harvest, but people move out there expecting to live in a wooded, residential area. Historically, that is not how it has been."

Landrey said the company has

owned some of the land for as long as 50 years, and all of it is within areas zoned "farm forest" or "general timber."

He added that PGE will reforest the area.

York said he does not think the steep walls of the canyon will withstand the logging.

"Maybe I'm wrong," York said. "Maybe when they're all done, that hill will still be up there. But I don't think the Sandy area has a more important resource than that river."

"I have to wonder, should this kind of resource be managed by a company whose only concern is to make a profit for (stock) holders?"

York said the Sandy River gorge is not as accessible to the public as the

Columbia River Gorge, and therefore only a handful of neighbors know what is occurring.

York and the Lookers said bear, elk and other wildlife live in the wooded area next to the river.

Richard Looker said PGE had asked him how he felt about spraying the stumps and trees on his property with a herbicide to help control the growth of brush. Looker said he was opposed to the idea for fear the herbicide would get into the river.

Landrey said he did not know if PGE was planning to spray the area. He said a 100-foot buffer strip was being left along the river and all state forestry requirements were being followed.

revenue or cut services. The city operates on a \$525,000 tax base.

Last spring, the city's budget committee argued that streets were more of a priority than recreation and senior citizen programs. Threats to reduce the senior citizen program led to protests by senior citizens, and the City Council reinstated the programs for another year.

But Councilor Larry Buck said the mandate from the budget committee

was clear. "It's like we (the city of Sandy) are paying for it, but other people are using it."

But, at the same time, Buck said the city of Sandy wants area residents to participate because user fees also help support recreation and senior citizen programs.

City Manager Tom Reber said he would not usually argue for a bigger-is-better philosophy, but in this case, recreation programs could benefit

from the economies of scale. It doesn't cost a great deal more to administer a league of 50 teams than it does a league of 20 teams, he said.

Formation of a district would take some time. One scenario would call for residents to get petitions signed by 15 percent of the voters in the proposed district, and then ask the Clackamas County Board to seek approval from the Portland Metropolitan Area Boundary Commission to form the district.

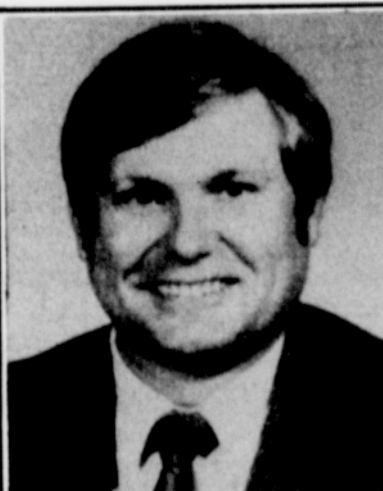
