County land use plan up for periodic review

Proposals to update Clackamas County's land use plan and ordinances must be submitted to the state by May 16, 1988, and citizens are being asked to assist with the update, according to Board of Commissioners Chairman Ed Lindquist.

Lindquist received notice from the Land Conservation and Development Commission on Nov. 19 that the state will conduct its "periodic review" based on county material and proposals submitted in May.

"Public participation was vital in drafting the current comprehensive plan, and we want that kind of participation to continue with this review and update," Lindquist said.

"The state listed a number of areas for review and possible change, but there are no surprises," said Public Affairs Director Ardis Stevenson.

The proposed "sunrise corridor" brought a question from the state land use agency. The notice asks about land use impacts, particularly

outside the regional urban growth boundary, of "proposed major highway improvements from the Marquam Bridge to Highway 26 at Boring Road."

The county, the state Department of Transportation and the Metropolitan Service District are exploring a better east-west link from Portland to Mount Hood. The proposal has been dubbed the sunrise corridor.

The state also noted that the county needs to plan for residential density of eight units per acre in urban areas.

"The sunrise corridor and development in the urban area fall into the LCD's category of 'change of circumstances.'" The county hopes citizens will identify other changes of circumstances that could mean land use plan amendments, Stevenson said.

Emphasis in the plan update will be on urban unincorporated areas, according to county officials.

Anna Collins

Anna L. Collins, a former resident of Sandy, died Nov. 28 at a care center at the age of 90.

Mrs. Collins, a resident of Gresham, was born the daughter of Charles and Emma Hornoff in Easton, Ohio, on June 4, 1897. She spent most of her early years and was educated in Ohio. She worked as a Linotype operator for a newspaper in Wadsworth, Ohio, and later as a printer at Ohio Match Co.

She married William H. Collins in Columbus, Ohio, in 1941. The couple lived in Ohio until 1947, when they moved to Sandy. Mrs. Collins worked for Northwest Book Binders, and was assigned to a number of jobs, including one at the Catholic Sentinel. She retired in 1966.

Her husband died in 1972, and she moved to Milwaukie in 1973 to be with her daughter, June. She moved to a Gresham care center in 1986 because of ill health.

Her hobbies included reading and flower gardening.

She is survived by her children, June Snyder of Escondido, Calif., William Mumaw of Eustis Park, Fla., John Mumaw of San Jacinto, Calif., and Jean Van Allen and Wan-

da Swartzkopf, both of Columbus, Ohio; nine grandchildren; 14 great-grandchildren; and one great-great-grandchild.

Alice Will

Alice Will, a retired grade school teacher, died in Sandy on Dec. 4 at the age of 76.

She was born Alice Catherine Lumley in Red Lodge, Mont., on March 15, 1911. She grew up in Montana with her four sisters and two brothers.

She reached her goal of becoming a teacher when she received her teaching certificate at Western Montana State. While living in Red Lodge, she met LaVerne "Whitey" Will.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Golden Age Club.

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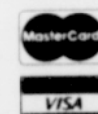
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Task force

"wet" industries was based on the belief that industries requiring a large sewage capacity should be willing to pay for that capacity.

One berry processing business in Sandy, which hauls its waste away at its own expense, generates approximately 40,000 gallons of residue per day during the peak processing season. Such a business would reduce the city's available sewer connections from 400 to 150.

Reber said Bob Hornsby, superintendent of the sewage treatment plant, helped the committee develop the finance plan following questioning by the task force at one of its first meetings.

Reber said Hornsby claims the

plant can be operated at the current budgeting level for several years. The first step of the plan, then, calls for placing user fees from new customers into a fund to pay for future plant expansion.

The final bond payment on the treatment plant will be made in 1991, and for several years afterward the \$38,000 payment also could be placed in the building fund.

A third part of the plan calls for dedicating \$300 of the \$800 connecting fee to the building fund. Approximately \$500 of the \$800 goes toward expenses. The extra \$300 now goes into a systems development fund, which pays for maintenance. Unexpected maintenance pro-

blems have the potential to reduce the size of the building fund, Reber said.

Funds from those sources would provide approximately \$982,840 toward the \$2 million plant expansion, the report said.

The task force also considered 21 proposals for expansion or construction of a new City Hall.

The proposal selected by the task force calls for an expansion at the current site, 39260 Pioneer Blvd., along with the purchase of the adjacent Boitano property when it becomes available. Total cost would be \$768,000, or 50 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

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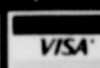
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
