Businessman named to PIC

Bruce Cook, president and owner of Group Benefit Systems Inc. of Sandy, was appointed recently by the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners to the Private Industry Council of Clackamas County Inc.

The PIC is a public/private partnership that governs programs for developing and training a work force for area employers. The PIC also oversees economic development programs that directly benefit local businesses.

According to Cook, who has hired people trained through the program, it is a "great way to benefit people, the community and a business all at the same time."

He said the PIC has launched successful programs that have helped many local Oregonians have a chance to contribute to bettering the economy.

The PIC's training and placement programs, which have served over 3,500 eligible residents and provided training reimbursements, tax savings and personnel services at no charge to over 450 businesses, are operated by Employment, Training and Business Services, a division of Clackamas County's Department of Human Services.

Cook and his wife have lived in Sandy for 16 years. They have three children and four grandchildren.

Ride service set for Sandy

A new transportation network is being planned for Sandy, but its success depends upon volunteer drivers, according to Brenda Breames, who is organizing the transportation network.

The Clackamas County TRP, which stands for Transportation Relying on People, is in every city in Clackamas County. Over 80 drivers provided 1,200 rides in March.

Breames said the service will be available to provide rides for people who need to do their grocery shopping, go to doctor's appointments, or for other vital services. It can also be utilized for recreational outings, she said.

"It's going to be Sandy people helping Sandy people," Breames said.

Twenty percent of the funding for the program comes from Clackamas County Social Services. The other 80 percent is from a Tri-Met grant.

The Sandy TRP office will be located at the Sandy Community Action Center, 38982 Pioneer Blvd. Rides will be provided seven days a week, 24 hours a day, Breames said.

Drivers are asked to make a minimum commitment of five hours a month. They will receive 20 cents per mile and TRP will provide the necessary training. Drivers must have their own liability insurance, but will also be covered by a \$500,000 insurance policy.

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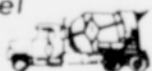
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
