Duane Knapp

Longtime Sandy businessman Duane Knapp died in Gresham on April 15 at the age of 76.

Duane Schuyler Knapp was born in Woodland, Wash., on Nov. 24, 1911. He graduated from Molalla High School in 1929 and attended the Oregon Normal School in Monmouth, where he received his teaching certificate.

Moving to the Sandy area, he taught at Bull Run and Sandy Elementary schools. He later served as principal at Sandy Elementary.

While working as a principal, Duane also began working in the logging industry.

In 1942 he entered the U.S. Army to serve in the European Theater. After his discharge in 1945, he returned to Sandy to teach and continue logging.

In the mid-1950s he incorporated his logging business, which was called the Skyline Logging Co. Besides logging, he was a partner in Firwood Veneer, a veneer plant east of Sandy, and later Mountain Fir Lumber Co., which has its headquarters in Salem.

On Feb. 12, 1955, he was married to Madeline Bates. They made their permanent home in Sandy, where they raised three children.

In 1970, he began farming east of Sandy. He later retired from logging and closed the veneer plant. His two sons joined him in raising raspberries and Angus cattle. At the time of his death, he was a member of the board of directors of the Mountain Fir Lumber Co.

In 1963, Mr. Knapp served as the first president of the Oral Hull Foundation for the Blind. He was also active as a member of the Sandy Community Presbyterian Church. In the past he had been a member of the Kiwanis Club, the Odd Fellows Lodge, the Masonic Lodge and the Grange. Because of his interest in young people, he was a strong supporter of the schools and Boy Scouts.

Survivors include his wife, Madeline; daughter: Kathleen Harrison of Sandy; two sons: William and John Knapp, both of Sandy; and three grandsons: Steven, David and Mathew.

Gerald Heacock

Gerald "Jerry" L. Heacock, a resident of Sandy for the past 15 years, died of cancer at his home on April 16 at the age of 45.

He was born the son of Martha and

Robert Heacock on Jan. 29, 1943, in Olivia, Minn. He moved as a young child with his parents to Montana. The family settled in Sidney, where he attended grade school and graduated from high school. He attended the State School of Science, where he majored in autobody repair.

He returned to Sidney and began a career as an autobody repairman with Gem City Motors. Soon after, he met and married his wife, Linda, on June 6, 1964, in Billings, Mont.

The couple lived in Sidney until 1970, when they moved to Portland. They moved to Sandy in 1972. He continued his career with Obrist & Cunningham until 1986, when his illness forced him to retire.

He is survived by his wife, Linda Heacock of Sandy; his children, Gerald Heacock and Jody Rae Heacock, both of Sandy; and his seven brothers and sisters, RoseAnne Maier of Portland, Carol Braun, Linda Hanson and Cynthia Sheehan, all of Sidney, Mont.; Twyla Campbell of Manhattan, Mont.; Barbara Sherman of Chicago, Ill.; and Robert Heacock of Port St. Joe, Fla.

Gordon Myers

Gordon W. Myers, a longtime Sandy resident, died in a Portland hospital April 12 at the age of 70.

He was born in Grafton, Ill., on Sept. 23, 1917. He was raised in Illinois, where he received his education. At an early age he began working on the family farm.

In 1943, Gordon entered the U.S. Army to serve in World War II. Attaining the rank of sergeant, Gordon received his discharge in 1946 and returned to Illinois to work for Shell Oil Co.

After working for Shell Oil, Gordon began his career in automobile body and fender repair. In 1951, he moved to Oregon to continue his trade. He retired in 1980.

Living in Portland, Gordon met and later married Jean Simpson on Sept. 22, 1956. The following year they came to Sandy to make their permanent home and raise a family. His wife preceded him in death in 1985.

Gordon was a member of the Sandy Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 4273.

Survivors include his two sons: Tom Simpson of Boring and Terry Simpson of Sandy; a brother: Virgil Myers of Illinois; a sister: Glennon Krueger, also in Illinois; and two grandchildren.
