

# Students do well at competition

## Sandy teams place first in industrial arts

Two teams of Sandy High School students finished first in an industrial arts skills competition held recently at Clackamas Community College.

Jason Winter and Mike Cejka finished first as a team in an automotive parts competition, and Gary Kutsch and Leng Tang finished first in arc welding.

Scott Seipert and Mike Barksdale finished second as a team in a shop safety competition, and Kevin Nelson and Walley Gabbey finished second in oxyacetylene welding.

Historically the metals teams have finished well at the annual competition, but this is the first year an automotive department team has placed, according to Lynn Sondenaar, industrial technology department chairman.

Cejka has experience working in a parts store and Winter is good at looking up parts as well, according to Mark Lally, automotive instructor.

"The competition was a good model of on-the-job experience," Lally said.

Sondenaar said Tang is "a very motivated kid." He recently completed a four credit hour course at Mt. Hood Community College on wire-feed welding.

But Sondenaar said all of the students who placed in the 13-team skills competition are good students. They are members of his advanced metals class.

In the two welding competitions, the students had to read blueprints and complete a number of difficult welds, Sondenaar said.

He said he was disappointed Nelson didn't win the oxyacetylene welding competition. Nelson finished second individually, but Sondenaar felt he was the best welder.

Gabbey, who finished third individually, does his best work as a machinist, but the machining com-

petition was canceled and he had to fill in as a welder at the last minute.

In the safety team competition, Seipert and Barksdale went through a shop looking for the incorrect types of fire extinguishers, improperly stored flammables, improper power tool guards and improper storage of hand tools.

# Shelli Campbell wins Sandy Junior Miss title

Shelli Campbell, a junior at Sandy High School, will represent Sandy at the Oregon Junior Miss Scholarship program Aug. 26 and 27 at the Hult Center for the Performing Arts in Eugene.

Campbell received a \$1,500 scholarship and also was the recipient of the "Spirit of Junior Miss" award.

Other scholarship recipients were Ali Lake, who received a \$900 scholarship as first alternate, and Cheryl Cochran, who was awarded a \$600 scholarship for her scholastic achievements.

Campbell is a member of the National Honor Society and plans to attend the University of Texas where she will study architecture.

The B & R Community Water System has consulted an engineer, Kent W. Cox and Associates, concerning the problem.

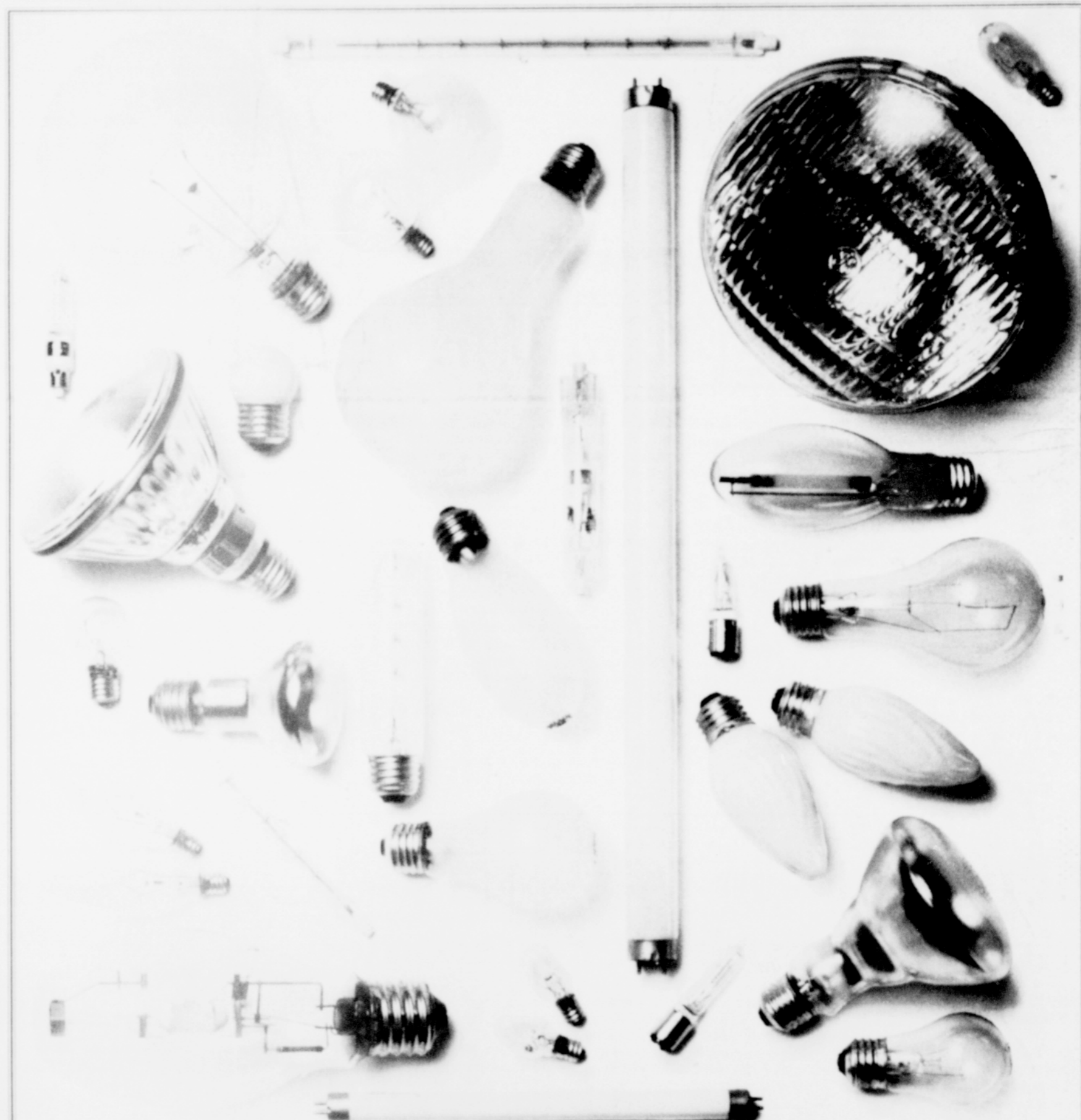
