Congress can ensure that our Wild Rogue is passed on to future generations of Oregonians.

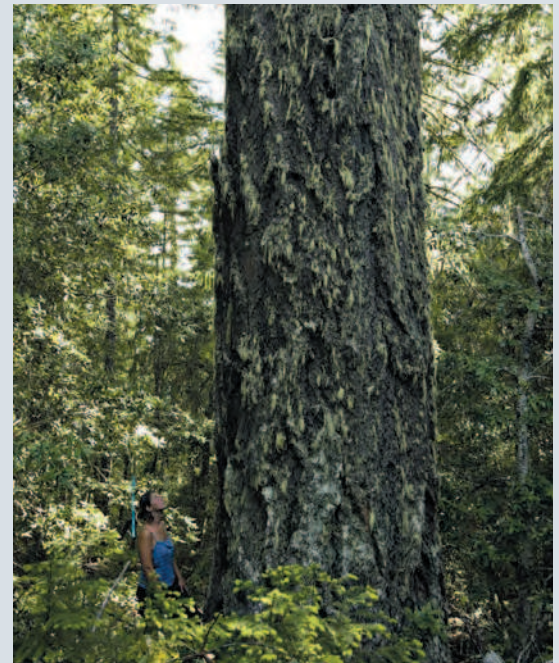

The Wild Rogue supports some of Oregon's best remaining salmon runs, magnificent old-growth forests, incredible wildlife habitat and a recreational wonderland. Nonetheless, the Bush Administration proposes to clearcut several square miles of virgin old-growth forest near the Lower Rogue Wild & Scenic River. If these threatened wildlands are added to the Wild Rogue Wilderness, they won't be roaded and logged. Congress can stop the Bush Administration.
