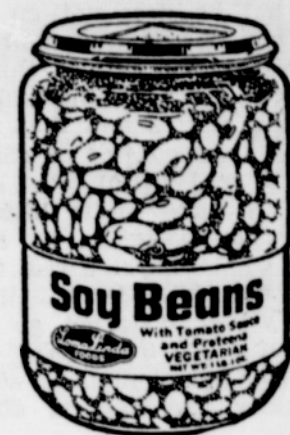
Mrs. Virgil Wolfe, who is in a San Francisco hospital following an operation, is reported doing well.
