Elmer Bankus returned home from the Knapp hospital, at Crescent City, Sunday.

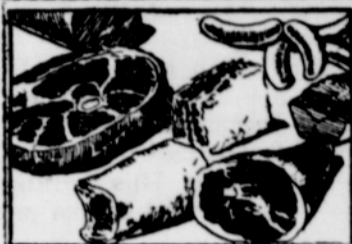

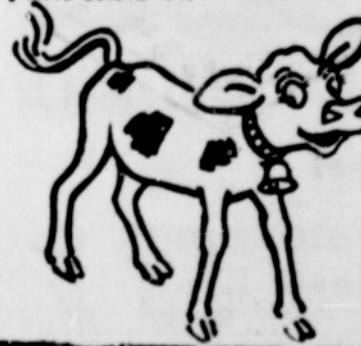
